MESSAGE FROM SHERIFF SEABOLT

Dear Randolph County Citizens,

I present to you the 2022 Randolph County Sheriff's Office Annual Report. As you will see in the report, the Randolph County Sheriff's Office continued to deliver the high level of services our citizens have come to expect, while continuing to navigate multiple challenges.

Our office has struggled to obtain replacement vehicles due to the delays in the supply chain. That issue compounded by the past two years of vehicle shortages due to the pandemic have created a critical shortage in the fleet inventory. However, I give high praises and credit to our Fleet Maintenance staff for maintaining our aging and high mileage vehicles that ensure deputies can answer calls and provide essential public safety services to our community.

Over the past 30 months, many deputies have retired, sought a different career path, or went to another law enforcement agency for higher pay. Our office is therefore left with a staffing shortage of deputies and detention officers. We are therefore working diligently with the County Commissioners on strategies to attract potential officers, retain the dedicated members we have, and bring retired officers back part-time to ensure your Sheriff's Office is adequately staffed.

The expansion of the jail was completed in 2021, but the renovations to the existing facility have been ongoing since then. Renovating a confinement facility that is already occupied has created some unique challenges for the detention staff. However, they have worked closely with the architects, contractor, county engineer and County Commissioners to expedite the project and the end is finally in sight, projected for early fall of 2023. During this project, detention staff has worked tirelessly to fill open positions, train new officers, develop and implement a comprehensive inmate classification system, improve safety and security, and implement new programs and services at the facility. I am confident that we have one of the safest jails in the state, despite the ongoing construction.

Criminal Investigations was moved to a new office space in 2022 and are now located in the Northgate Plaza on N. Fayetteville Street. The office space has allowed us to expand the digital forensics lab and add a much needed second interview room. The detectives have

continued to work cold cases and have recently been able to close one of those cases.

In 2022, our office partnered with the City of Trinity to add three new deputies for the Trinity Law Zone, as that community experiences a higher call volume than most other communities in the county. These additional deputies will allow the other county deputies to focus their patrol efforts in the more rural parts of the county thereby reducing response times. Our office will continue to develop strategies to reduce the length of time citizens have to wait for a deputy to respond to calls for service.

Our office also collaborated with the Randolph County Schools to add four more School Resource Officers to protect our children at the County elementary schools. As we are able to fill those positions in 2023, those deputies will be assigned to specific schools within each zone of the county to protect our most precious resource.

The report reflects the dedication and incredible accomplishments over the last year and provides insight into how each division operates. The men and women of the Randolph County Sheriff's Office are dedicated to serving the citizens. The positive relationship we have with our citizens is a result of the ongoing commitment to transparency, community partnerships, and being present daily in each corner of our 789 square mile county.

The relationships we share with business owners, local government leaders, and citizens, ensures that our county is the best place to **live, work, play** and **do business**. Ensuring that our county is safe, desirable, and offers a great quality of life, are basis of what we do each day.

My Command Staff and I are developing strategies to address the future needs of our citizens based on the projected growth that the Toyota battery plant and expansive housing development in the City of Trinity will bring to our county. We understand that economic development is imperative to grow our economy but also realize that it will be our responsibility, as your Sheriff's Office, to protect and serve those additional citizens and businesses. We are determined to be adequately prepared to offer the same level of service and protection to our citizens in the future.

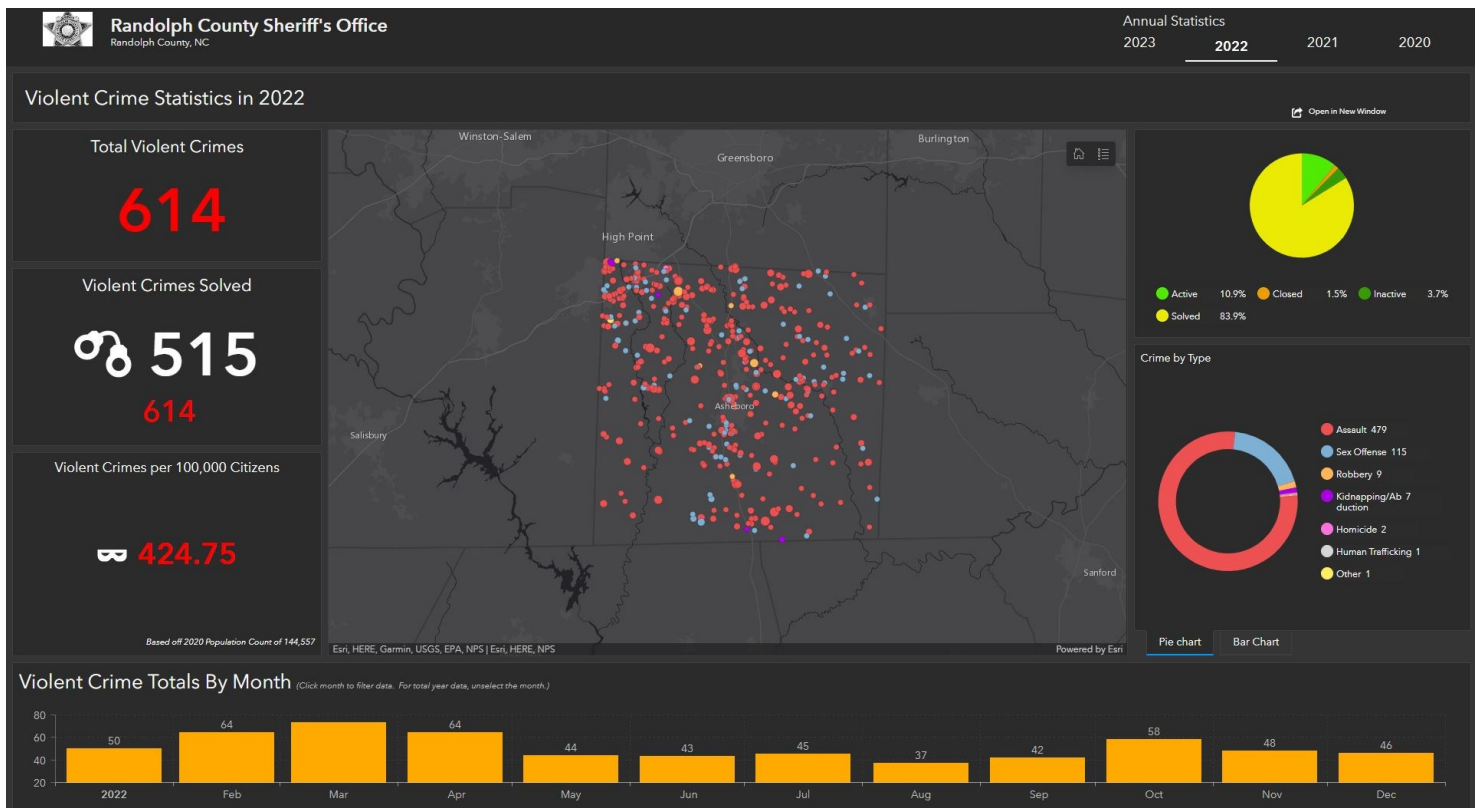

CRIME STATISTICS

In 2021, the Randolph County Sheriff's Office, in collaboration with the Randolph County Information Technology Department, completed the software conversion from Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) to National Incident Based Reporting System (NIBRS), improving the overall quality of crime data collected and reported. The new reporting format captures each criminal offense committed during each reported criminal incident. NIBRS provides more concise and complete statistics of crime in Randolph County.

2022 Major Crime Statistics

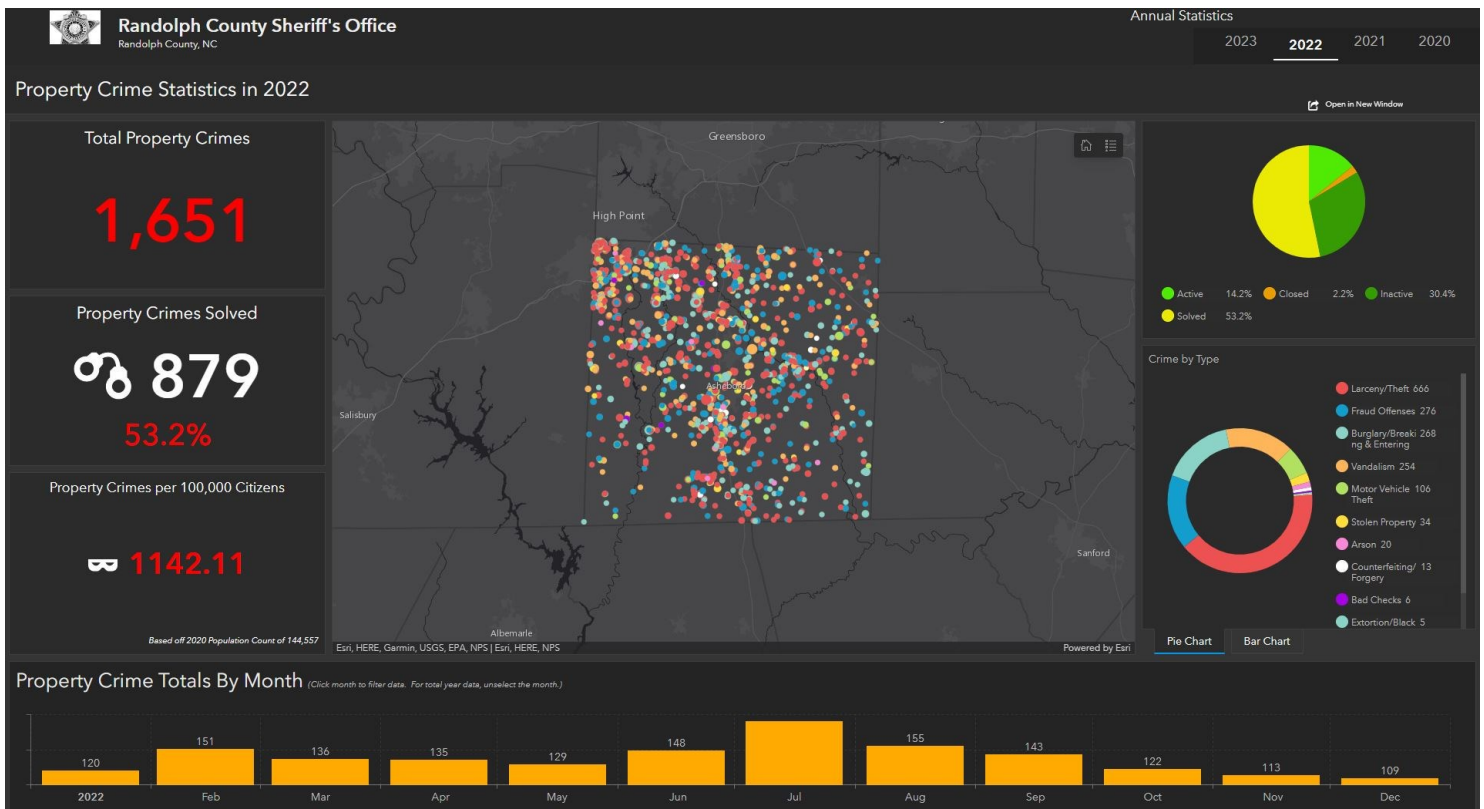


Submission of crime statistics to the SBI is voluntary. The primary objective is to generate a reliable set of criminal statistics for use by agencies for research and planning. However, citizens view crime statistics as a report card for law enforcement, and as social indicators when planning where to buy a home, open a business, or where to send their children to school.

CRIME STATISTICS

Crime statistics are generally reported under two categories of major (violent) crimes and property crimes. Major crimes include all degrees of murder, kidnapping, rape, sex offenses, human trafficking, robbery and assaults resulting in serious injury, that are categorized as felonies. Property crimes include all crimes that include theft or damage to property, such as but not limited to, burglary, larceny, fraud, identity theft, possession of stolen property, arson, etc. The crime rate is based on the number of crimes per 100,000 residents. Randolph County reportedly has 143,735 residents as of 2022 with an estimated growth rate of 0.17% yearly. Randolph County is the 21st most populated county in the state of North Carolina out of 100 counties.

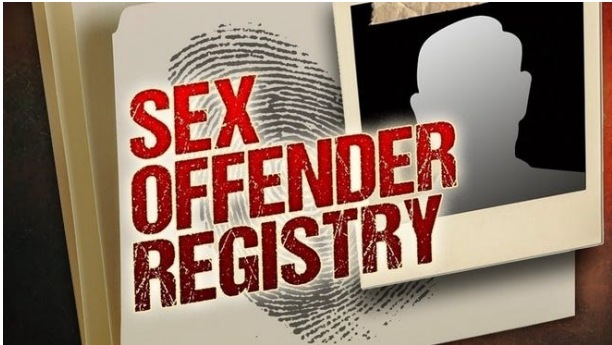
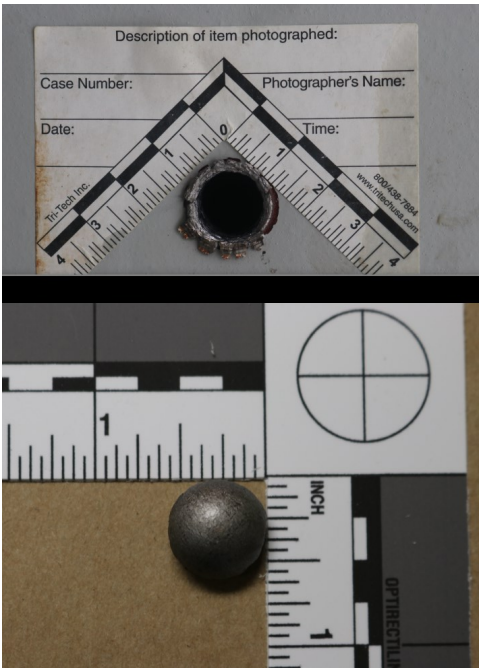
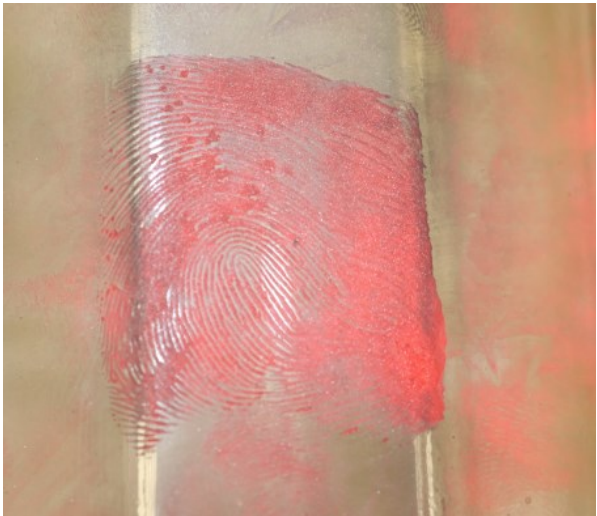
2022 Property Crimes Statistics



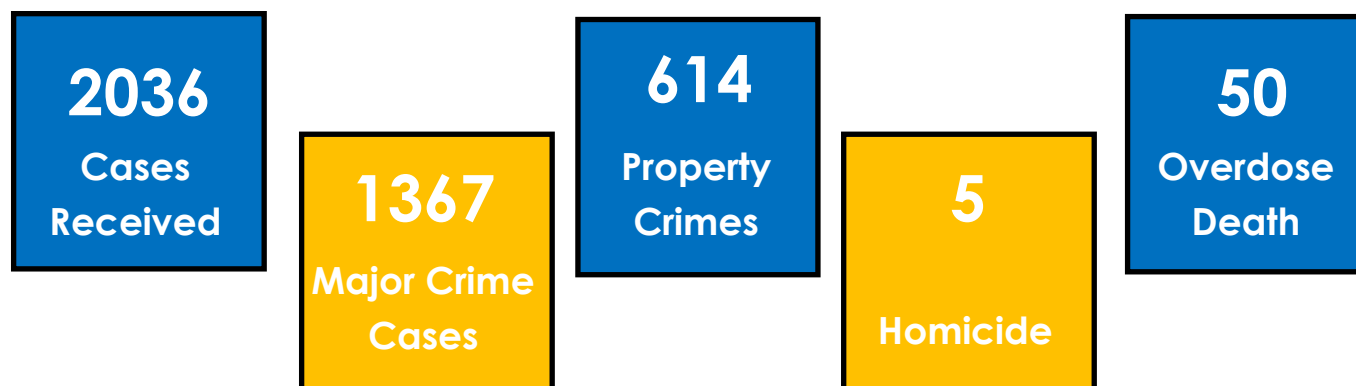

The Criminal Investigations Division includes the Detective Division, Crime Scene Investigations, and Sex Offender Registry.

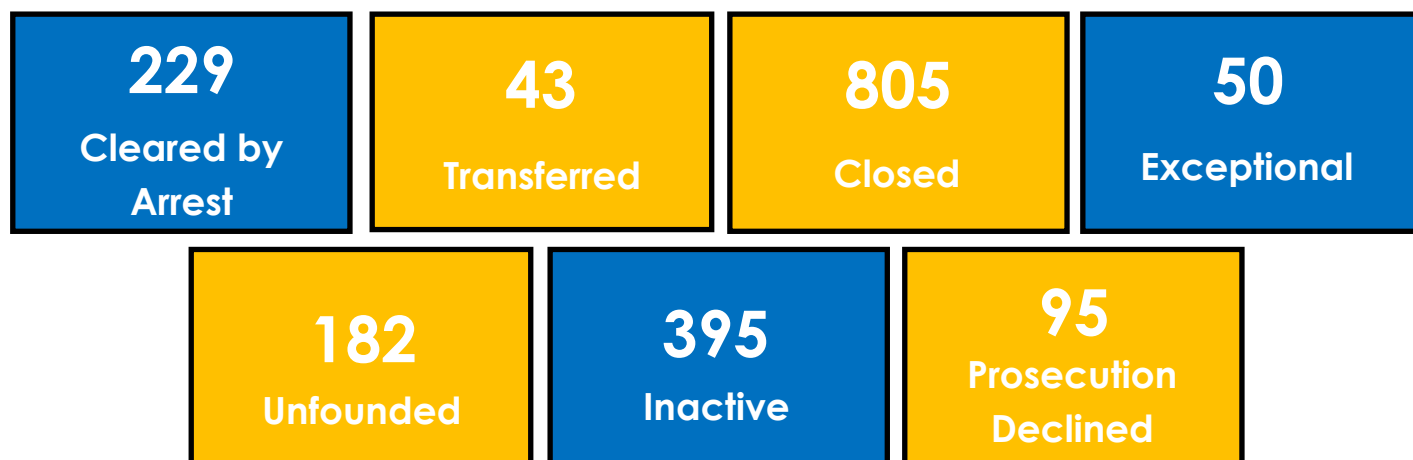


CRIMINAL INVESTIGATIONS DIVISION

DETECTIVE DIVISION**2022 Division Stats**

The Detective Division is divided into two units: Major Crimes and Property Crimes. Although every detective is capable of investigating a variety of crimes, Detectives are assigned to specialized investigations based on their interests, personality, and skill set. By concentrating on particular types of crime, detectives gain vast technical experience, skills, training, and knowledge that makes them more effective investigators of those particular crimes. In 2022, there were sixteen full-time Detectives in the Detective Division. Four Detectives are supervisors who are on

call for a week at a time, available to assist Detectives with call-outs and supervise complex crimes scenes as necessary. The twelve Detectives are on-call once every twelve days for a 24-hour period. A Detective is therefore always available for incidents that require investigation beyond the scope and limits of the Patrol Division. The Detective Division is supported by a Law Enforcement Clerk and a Victim Advocate, as well as a volunteer with an extensive investigations background, who reviews cold case files.

The Special Victims Unit comprises detectives who specialize in investigating sex offenses, assaults, cybercrimes, child abuse, elder abuse, missing persons, death investigations, and Internet Crimes Against Children (ICAC). These detectives work closely with the Family Crisis Center and Emmy's House to ensure victims receive the resources they need.

The ICAC Unit, a part of the Special Victims Unit, is even more specialized as they receive extensive training in computer forensics and related investigations. They receive tips from outside sources about internet crimes. Detectives investigate those leads for validity and complete an extensive fact-finding investigation. These investigations sometimes lead to the identification of children who have been sexually abused. Perpetrators of these crimes are prosecuted on the State level or, often, in Federal Court.

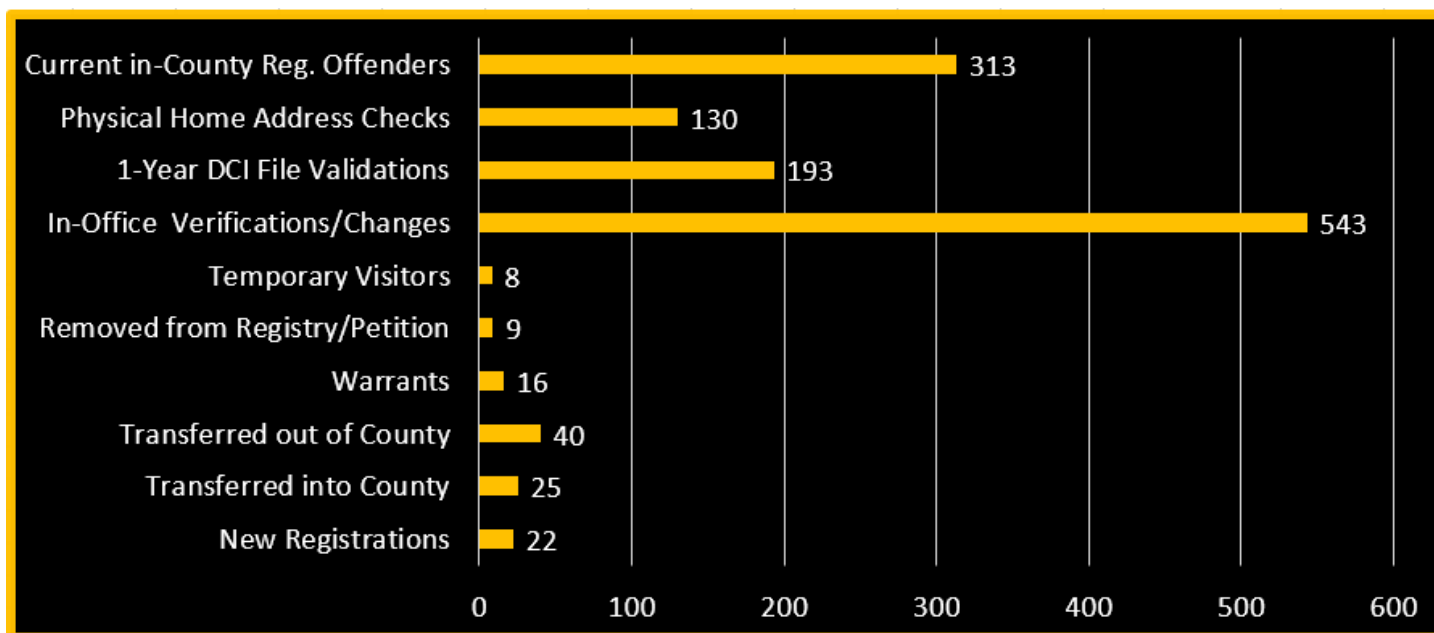

SEX OFFENDER REGISTRY

The Sex Offender Registry Detective is an important part of the Randolph County Sheriff's Office, supervising all registered sex offenders residing in the county. This division keeps offenders in check, ensuring they are abiding by the conditions of the registry. There are many laws governing offender compliance while on the registry and our officers make sure each offender complies with the law. Officers ensure offender addresses are valid and not located in restricted areas, and that offenders do not violate prohibited area restrictions. In cases where an offender willfully violates the conditions of the Sex Offender Registry, they are criminally charged with the violation and arrested.

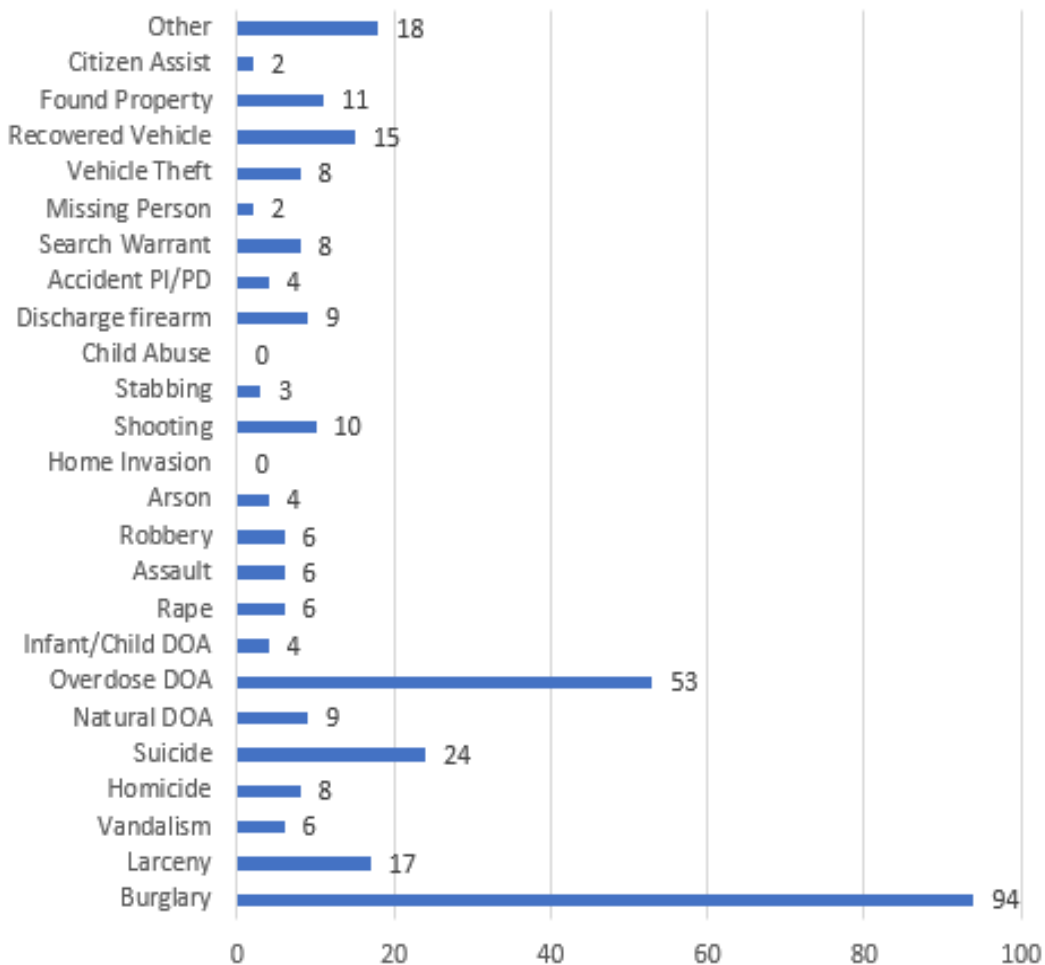
CRIMINAL INVESTIGATIONS DIVISION

CRIME SCENE INVESTIGATIONS

The CSI Division collects evidence such as latent prints, blood, fibers, and physical evidence at crime scenes. CSI Technicians also photograph, videotape, and sketch crime scenes to recreate the scene at a later date for investigation and prosecution. In addition, CSI Technicians process evidence for submission to a forensic laboratory. The CSI Division comprises five sworn deputies, two supervisors, and three technicians. They respond 24 hours a day, seven days a

week, to all crime scenes in the county that require evidence collection and processing beyond the capabilities of patrol deputies. CSI Technicians work hand-in-hand with Detectives to ensure all pertinent evidence is collected and the entirety of each crime scene is thoroughly documented. Additionally, CSI Technicians are assigned cases for follow-up and investigation to assist Detectives with caseloads. They are an intricate part of Criminal Investigations.

Goals for 2023

1. Develop and implement standard operating procedures that address organizational gaps in policy.

- Standard operating procedure for forensic analysis, evidence handling, and subsequent reporting of findings, of electronic devices by the ICAC forensic lab.
- Standard operating procedure for ICAC reporting of cyber tips.
- Standard operating procedure for evidence chain of custody, new detective selection process, and detective file archive process for pending and/or cold case(s).

2. Individual Career Development for Investigators.

- Identify and implement a core curriculum of training for new criminal investigators.
- Identify and implement a core curriculum of training for new crime scene investigators.

3. Explore new technology and/or use of existing resources to improve community safety, reduce crime, and increase solvability of reported criminal offenses.

- Explore Clearview AI (Facial recognition software)
- License Plate Readers (Potentially expanding the use of LPR data)
- Collaborating with Intelligence Analyst (Wright) in an effort to implement intelligence led policing practices and predictive policing in property related crimes.
- Collaborate with other Sheriff's divisions and surrounding law enforcement agencies in information sharing.
- Utilize crime scene investigators to assist in the compliance checks of registered sex offenders.

SPECIAL OPERATIONS DIVISION

The Special Operations Division consists of the Vice Narcotics Unit and the Criminal Interdiction Team. The Vice Narcotics Unit consists of eight detectives, one of which is assigned to the DEA task force in Greensboro, NC. The Criminal Interdiction Team consists of two Units, the Highway Interdiction Team and the Urban Interdiction Team. Nine detectives staff these teams. The Special Operations division has an Administrative Assistant and a Criminal Analyst that provide outstanding support services to the detectives assigned to the division.

Administrative Assistant:

The Special Operations Division has an Administrative Assistant that has many duties including:

- Receiving and disseminating citizen complaints of drug activity
- Filing and organization of criminal files and processes
- Scheduling and preparing files for the court process
- Preparing files to be turned over to the District Attorney for prosecution
- Clerical Duties as assigned by the Division Captain
- Acts as a liaison for the Public Information Officer in regards to information released to the press

The Administrative Assistant has seen an increasing workload and provides outstanding support services to the division.

Crime Analyst:

In late 2022, a Criminal Analyst was assigned to the Special Operations Division. The Criminal Analyst has proven to be an invaluable addition to the division and provides an important

function that assists detectives in their investigations. The Criminal Analyst has many duties including:

- Analyzing data obtained from open source databases that relate to open investigations
- Analyzing data obtained at the conclusion of investigations
- Analyzing mobile device data that can identify persons involved in criminal activity
- Search and download of seized mobile devices
- Maintaining crime maps and statistics
- Acts as a liaison to Randolph County Crime Stoppers
- Handles requests for assistance from other divisions within the Sheriff's Office and outside agencies
- Performs intelligence gathering for Criminal Interdiction and the Vice Narcotics Unit

The Criminal Analyst's workload helps save valuable time for detectives by alleviating them from time consuming intelligence gathering and analyzing of data. This allows detectives to spend more time on the street investigating their cases.

The Special Operations Division is a group of experienced, highly trained, and professional investigators that always strive to conduct proactive policing while respecting the rights of the citizens they come into contact with.

Highlights of 2022:

- The addition of modern computer and criminal interdiction specific equipment.
- Several notable narcotics and currency seizures by both the Vice Narcotics Unit and Criminal Interdiction Team.
- The addition of an automated modern field testing machine that allows officers to field test potentially deadly street narcotics with a minimum amount of exposure to the substance.



2023 Goals:

- Continue to modernize equipment and keep pace with the ever changing investigative techniques and trends.
- Continue to provide professional proactive policing that represents the Sheriff's Office in a favorable light to the community we serve.



VICE NARCOTICS UNIT

The Vice Narcotics Unit is responsible for investigating illegal narcotic activity taking place within Randolph County. The unit is comprised of eight detectives, one of which is assigned to the DEA Task Force based in Greensboro, NC. The Vice Narcotics unit work many investigations inside Randolph County that lead to sources of supply that are outside of their jurisdictional boundaries. These cases help establish connections with other local agencies as well as state and federal agencies that assist in the overall mission of arresting and prosecuting those responsible for distributing narcotics. The Vice Narcotics Unit works many cases that are joint investigations and the unit has a good working relationship with state, federal and local partners. In addition to these joint investigations, the Vice Narcotics Unit has worked numerous cases that have been adopted by federal authorities. The Vice Unit has been modernized within the last four years and has proven themselves to be very adept at investigating narcotics cases using modern investigative techniques and equipment. The Vice Narcotics Unit has many duties that include:

- Investigating citizen complaints of drug activity
- Utilizing confidential sources/undercover officers to assist in drug investigations
- Investigating those responsible for distributing narcotics in and around Randolph County
- Working undercover
- Work with state, local, and federal prosecutors to build cases for prosecution

CRIMINAL INTERDICTION TEAM

The Criminal Interdiction Team has nine uniformed detectives, including three K-9 officers who make a distinct difference in the county.

Detectives assigned to the Criminal Interdiction Team have varied duties that they perform. The Criminal Interdiction Team has many duties, which include:

- Conducting Sobriety and License Checkpoints
- Investigating Thefts of Motor Vehicles, Construction Equipment, ATVS and Catalytic Convertors
- Conducting High Volume Traffic Stops that target drug traffickers, money couriers, human traffickers and other criminals that travel within the county
- Conduct saturation patrols that are based on trends in crime in specific geographical areas



- Participate in state programs and campaigns related to traffic enforcement such as "Booze It and Lose It" and "Click It or Ticket"
- Assisting other state, local, and federal agencies in investigations
- Assisting other units and divisions within the Sheriff's Office with support or investigative services

CANINE UNIT

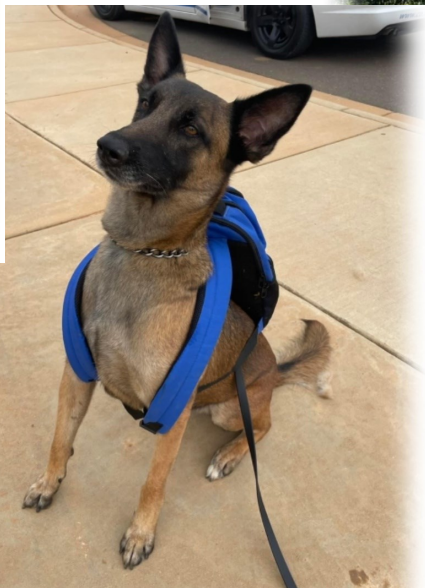

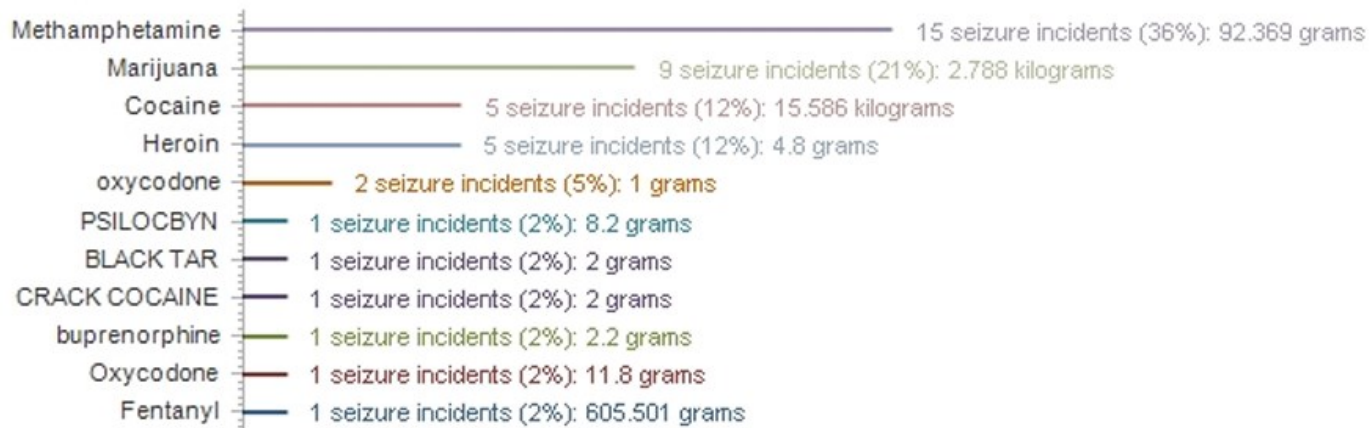

Major Accomplishments of 2022:

- Assigned new bloodhound “Dixie” to the new K9 handler
- All K9 teams within the Randolph County Sheriff’s Office obtain certification through the NNDDA in all required fields of skill
- “Frank,” our newest K9, had a few significant seizures of illegal substances and US Currency—all still pending conviction.
- The total unit track and find numbers improved and the accuracy grew.

New Goals for 2023:

- Purchase and assign a new multipurpose K9 that will be assigned to the Patrol Division
- Ultimately grow in knowledge and experience so that our effectiveness and efficiency will reflect growth statistically and in the community
- Send deputies (handlers and non-handlers) to “decoy” school to develop better training scenarios and build each of our canine’s confidence when apprehending suspects.

PATROL DIVISION

The Randolph County Sheriff's Office provides patrol services 24 hours a day, seven days a week, and prioritizes response to calls for service made to 911 Communications using available resources to enhance the safety of the public and sheriff's office members. The function of Patrol is to respond to calls for assistance and reports of criminal activity, act as a deterrent to crime, enforce state and local laws, identify community needs, provide support, and assistance to the community and respond to emergencies. They provide mutual aid and assistance to other agencies for emergency and law enforcement-related activities; Patrol deputies investigate reported cases and make an arrest or take out warrants on suspects, if possible. Cases that cannot be solved within their shift are

referred to the Criminal Investigations Division for additional investigation. Each patrol team comprises eleven deputies who respond to calls across nearly 800 square miles to assist citizens. Patrol teams work a 12-hour shift from 5:30 to 5:30, rotating two weeks of day shift and two weeks of the night shift. It is a common misconception that Sheriff's Deputies do not work traffic or issue citations for motor vehicle violations. All Randolph County Sheriff's Deputies are equipped with E-Citation and are authorized to enforce motor vehicle laws. However, the primary focus of patrol is responding to citizen calls for service, performing crime prevention activities (such as residential and business inspections) and often doing community presentations.

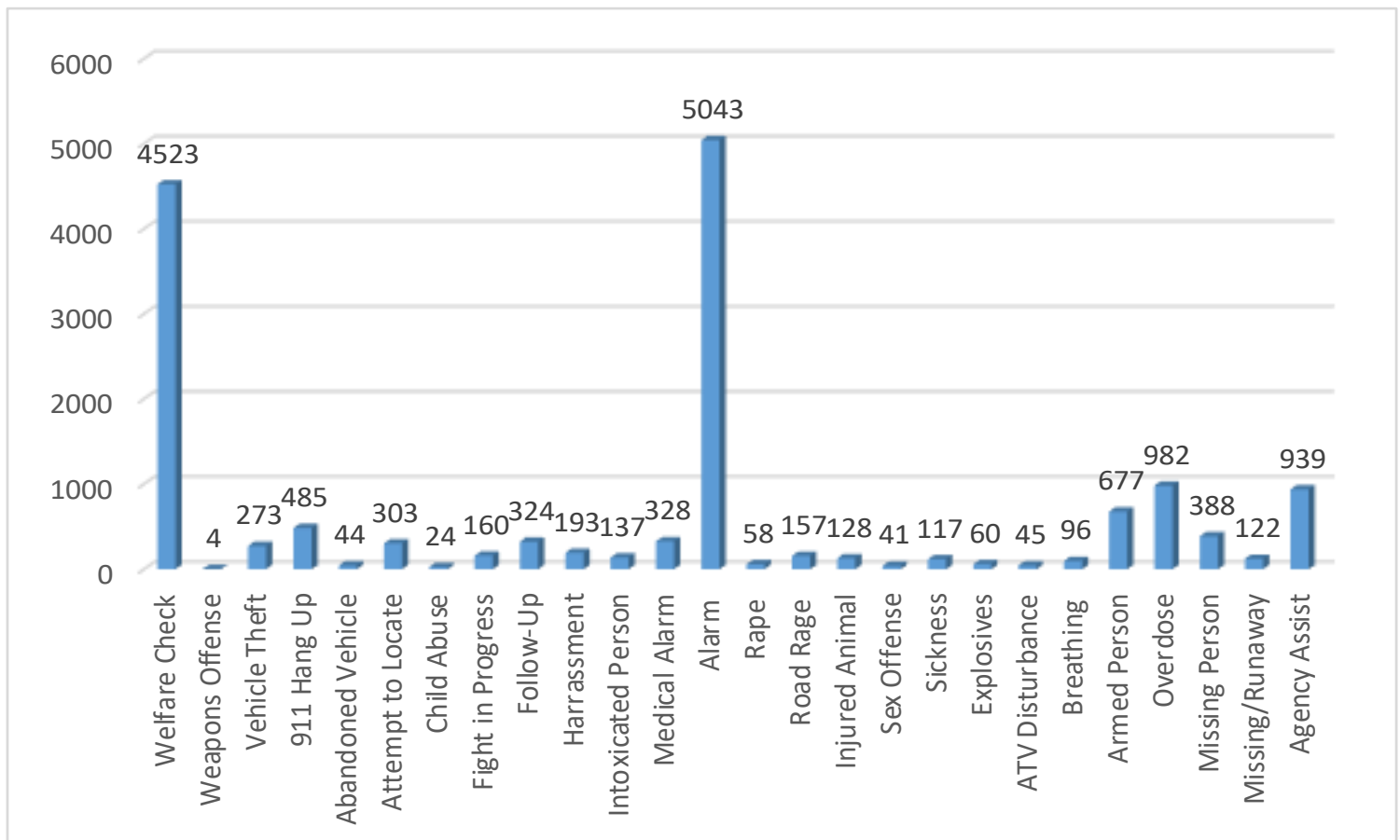

PATROL DIVISION

In addition to call response, patrol deputies routinely check area businesses and schools after hours to ensure those buildings are secure. Proactively, patrol often conducts investigatory traffic stops in areas that have experienced a recent spike in crime. Patrol deputies are also responsible for serving Involuntary Commitment Orders and Domestic Violence Protective Orders after hours or when Civil Division deputies are not available. They also serve warrants and subpoenas when feasible. Patrol often responds to the Randolph County Detention

Center when emergencies arise and additional personnel is needed there. Patrol deputies are the backbone of the Sheriff's Office. They represent most interactions that citizens have with law enforcement in the county and therefore have the greatest impact on the impression and opinion most citizens have of us. Our patrol deputies go above and beyond to resolve issues and citizen disputes, treat people with respect, and exemplify professionalism in law enforcement.

During the 2022 year, the court system continued to catch up from the effects of the COVID-19 shutdown. Increased court sessions have added strain to the bailiff division which continued to operate with 22 full-time bailiffs and three part-time bailiffs. In addition to covering each of the seven courtrooms with security, bailiffs also monitor advanced camera systems, conduct security screenings upon courthouse entry, assist members of the jury, serve warrants and other legal papers, escort inmates to and from holding, track inmate paperwork, assist defendants with filling out court-appointed counsel form when needed, make arrests, handle evidence and paperwork, assist the clerks and judges, comfort domestic violence and child victims, and maintain general order in the courtroom and lobby areas. Several bailiffs also provide security for monthly County Commissioner meetings and Planning and Zoning meetings. The Clerk's Office had a major renovation this

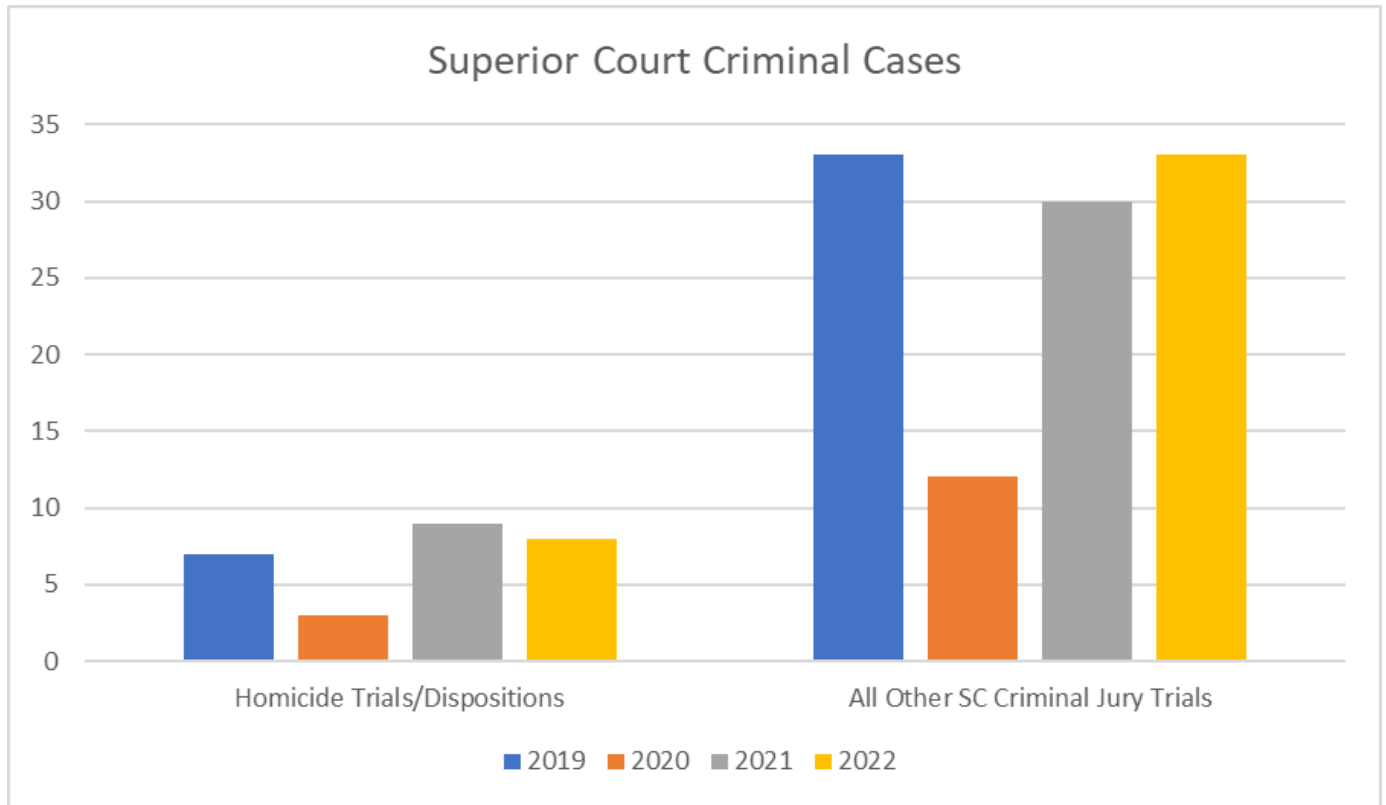


year and bailiffs worked off-duty as construction continued after-hours. New security system measures were implemented with the completion of the Clerk's Office renovations. In addition to regular courthouse security in 2022, the bailiff division served 344 Orders for Arrest/Warrants, 184 civil papers, 66 criminal summons, 17 subpoenas, and 1 citation. Courthouse bailiffs also completed three Code 1 incidents. All bailiffs continue to receive regular training in firearms, legal updates, and medical emergencies. The bailiffs also regularly give tours to members of the public and school groups upon request.

COMMUNITY BASED PROGRAMS DIVISION

The Community Based Programs Division includes the School Resource Officer (SRO) Program, Drug Abuse Resistance Education (DARE) Program, Child Abuse Reduction Effort (CARE) Program, Junior Sheriff's Academy (JSA), Community Outreach (previously Crime Prevention), and the Criminal Apprehension Team (CAT). The Division is supervised by a Captain and a Lieutenant who focus on community outreach, education, and public safety.

SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICERS

The Randolph County Sheriff's Office employs nineteen School Resource Officers (SROs) assigned to provide law enforcement services at every public high school and middle school in Randolph County, Uwharrie Charter Academy, and Randolph Community College. In addition, they also assist with security and emergency law enforcement response to the elementary schools surrounding their assigned schools and private schools. They are there to provide campus security, ensure the safety of students and staff, keep order, investigate crimes that occur on campus, educate students on the effects of illicit substances and law-related topics, and help students with issues that arise on and off campus. Most importantly, all SROs mentor students and act as role models for all students. During the summer months, School Resource Officers further their education, sharpen their law enforcement skills and receive specialized law enforcement training by

attending continuing education classes. They may also be assigned to other divisions, such as Criminal Investigations, and Criminal Interdiction, for educational purposes. The training SROs attend is generally focused on school-related issues and includes, but is not limited to, Threat Assessment for SROs, SRO Survival, Advanced SRO Training, SRO Ethics, and Police Canine in Public Schools. Other classes that SROs are required to attend include Police Law Institute, Child Abuse Investigations, and Drug Recognition Training. These classes are in addition to their annually required firearms qualifications and state-mandated in-service training. No other job in law enforcement affords a better opportunity to influence and positively impact future generations than being a School Resource Officer. We salute our SROs for their continued dedication and commitment.

SROs work with 41 schools throughout the county.

CHILD ABUSE REDUCTION EFFORT PROGRAM



The Randolph County Sheriff's Office has two full-time, sworn officers assigned to teach the CARE Program to all second-grade students in the county and city schools. CARE was founded in Randolph County in 1992 by former Sheriff Litchard Hurley to address child sex abuse in Randolph County. The Randolph County and Asheboro City School Boards adopted the CARE Program as a part of the second-grade curriculum. The program is taught one day a week for 12 weeks in each classroom. The instruction teaches students how to recognize abuse, how to react to it, and what they should do if it happens to them or a friend. CARE Officers develop bonds of trust with their students, creating an atmosphere of openness and honesty.

The C.A.R.E. program originally used visual presentations, puppets, pre-recorded lesson plans, and a workbook to teach students the principles and skills to navigate abuse. The main character, Carey was professionally animated and introduced in the Fall of 2022 and the hand puppet was retired. Carey is utilized as a teaching aid for the students. The C.A.R.E. Officer and students interact with him throughout the lessons by use of the school's Smart Boards. Carey takes the journey along with the students to learn about how to stay Happy, Safe, and Healthy. The additional character, Tommy the Turtle was also animated. Tommy's role in the C.A.R.E. program is to assist the students in understanding their feelings and reminds them of the importance of being Happy.

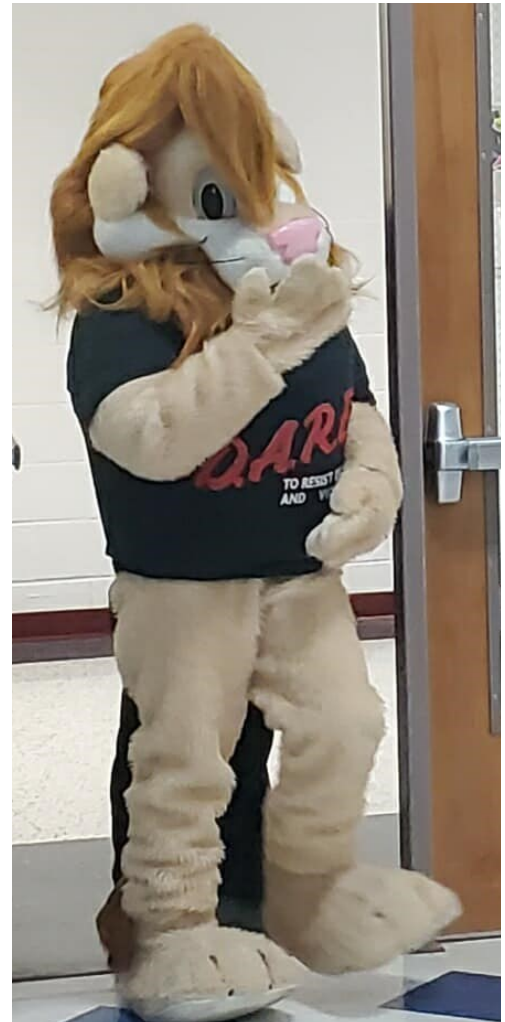
DRUG ABUSE RESISTANCE EDUCATION PROGRAM

The DARE Program has two full-time Officers that teach in elementary schools across the county. There are five SROs certified as DARE Instructors that help deliver the DARE Program at their feeder schools and a summer camp.



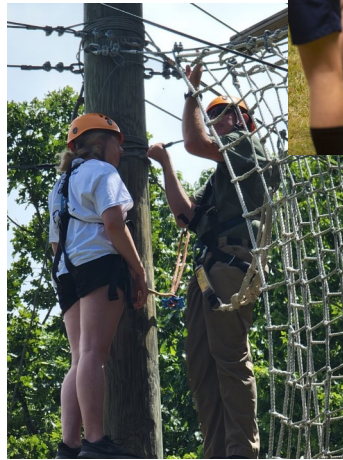
Since 1987, the Randolph County Sheriff's Office has been pleased to provide DARE instruction to all Randolph County fifth grade students. Project DARE is a cooperative effort between the Randolph County Sheriff's Office, the Randolph County Board of Education, Uwharrie Charter Academy, Fayetteville Street Christian School, and Faith Christian School. Project DARE is a program designed to teach the students how to "SAY NO" to illegal drugs and the pressures placed upon them by peers, based on reason rather than internal and external forces.

DARE teaches students how to weigh negative and positive consequences, how to build good self-esteem, recognize and deal with peer-type pressures, and much more. These are all very important factors that the students will face in future years that will surely have an influence on their life. We must not lose sight of our younger generation. As the saying goes, "Our young people of today will be our leaders of tomorrow." In the summer of 2022, two more SROs obtained certifications to instruct the DARE program.



JUNIOR SHERIFF'S ACADEMY

During the summer months, SROs are tasked with orchestrating and facilitating the Junior Sheriff's Academy (JSA). Historically, the Sheriff's Office hosts three, one-week sessions of the Junior Sheriff's Academy each summer. Each JSA camp session hosts an average of 24 male and female middle school and high school students, between the ages of 12 and 15, interested in public service (law enforcement, fire, EMS, or military service). JSA Cadets must be residents of Randolph County or attend a school in Randolph County and be of good moral character, have good behavior, and must be willing to face their fears and try new things. The JSA curriculum focuses on teamwork exercises, self-discipline, motivation, and leadership. Cadets are introduced to crime scene investigations, K-9 and SWAT demonstrations, search and rescue, water rescue, rappelling, CPR, basic firefighting skills, and much, much more. Most importantly, SROs, firefighters, and emergency services personnel, establish mentor relationships with cadets. Cadets learn through this program how to become peer mentors to others and the personal



satisfaction of serving their community. In 2022, the Randolph County Sheriff's Office had an additional one-day Junior Sheriff's Academy for Special Needs Students. Fifteen students and their caretakers attended the event that included an Honorary Deputy Swearing-In Ceremony, Bearcat show-and-tell, robot demonstration, Mobile Command Post-tour, demonstrations by local fire departments. All cadets were recognized by the SROs and the Sheriff's Office Command Staff for their participation and attendance. More importantly, the SROs were afforded one-on-one time with their Special Needs students to establish mentor relationships and speak with caretakers to better serve those students.

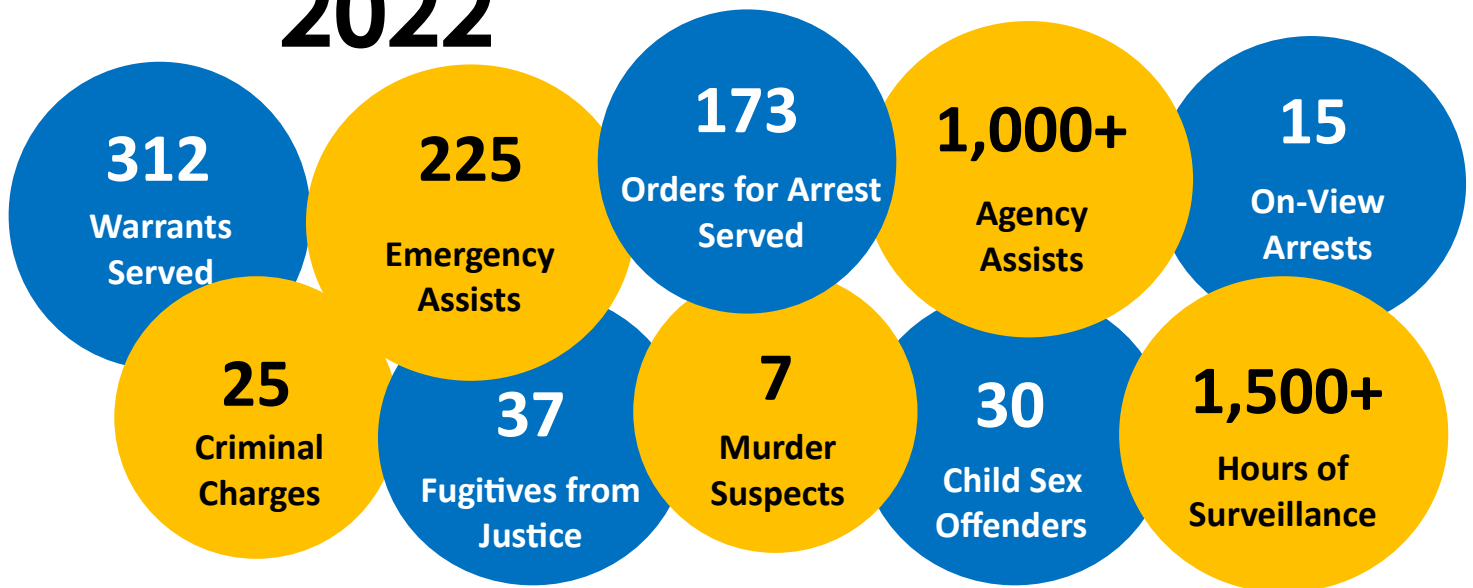
CRIMINAL APPREHENSION TEAM



The Randolph County Sheriff's Office Criminal Apprehension Team (CAT) was established in June 2019. The team consists of four full-time sworn deputies, including one Sergeant. This team is highly pro-active and specializes in the apprehension of violent criminals and wanted fugitives. The members of the Criminal Apprehension Team have received extensive, specialized training on state and federal levels to locate and apprehend wanted fugitives, as well as other wanted individuals in Randolph County.

Because of their specialized training, the team routinely assists other agencies in locating wanted fugitives in other counties and states. CAT often follows leads outside of Randolph County in order to apprehend wanted individuals that have fled to other counties on felony charges committed inside of Randolph County. CAT also works closely with other Randolph County agencies, in addition to state and federal agencies.

COMMUNITY OUTREACH PROGRAM

The Community Outreach Program is operated by one sworn deputy who facilitates community-based programs for the Sheriff's Office by attending community events, conducting site security inspections, teaching awareness programs to citizens, and hosting community meetings as requested. The Randolph County Sheriff's Office is committed to building relationships with citizens and earning trust from our community through communication and collaboration. The Randolph County Sheriff's Office provides church security training, helps coordinate neighborhood watch meetings, and manages the citizen well-check program and other community outreach programs. Sheriff Seabolt and his deputies love to meet and interact with

citizens. The community is encouraged to contact the Sheriff's Office with information, concerns, and needs in their communities. Deputies are encouraged to participate in community events and solicit citizen feedback, which helps the Sheriff's Office better serve the community.

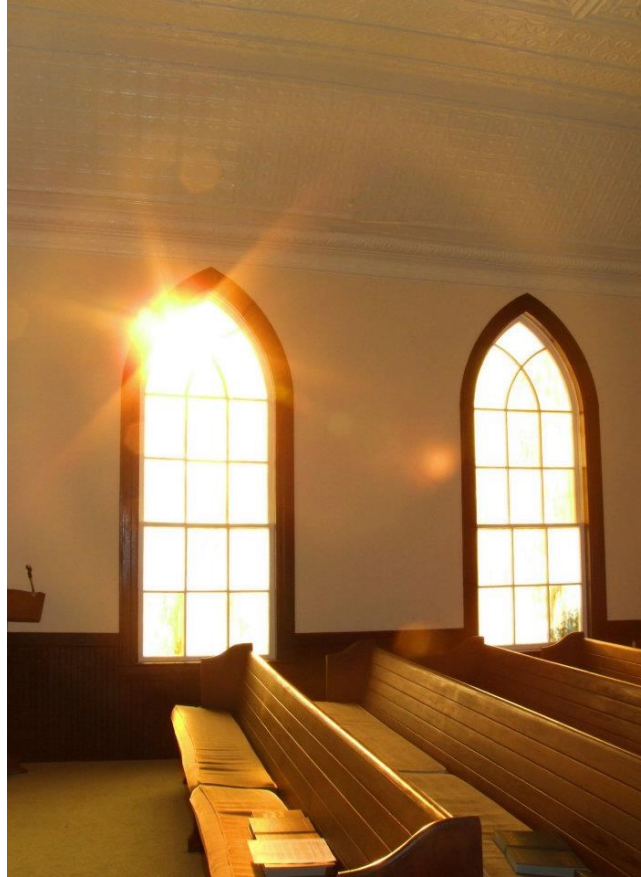

PLACE OF WORSHIP SECURITY & SAFETY TRAINING



There are nearly 400 places of worship in Randolph County. Over the last several years, places of worship have been the target of violent, life-changing acts. The Randolph County Sheriff's Office offers security training and advisement to our places of worship to help prevent and deter violent acts. This training uses scenarios and discussion to encourage ideas on protection. North Carolina laws, such as the use of deadly force, are presented and discussed. A walk-through survey of the church is conducted and we discuss areas of easy access and other points within the church. Recommendations are given on target hardening recommendations. The training is free to any place of worship.

COMMUNITY SURVEILLANCE PARTNER

In 2021, Sheriff Seabolt and his Command Staff created a new program called the Community Surveillance Partner Program. This program allows citizens to register their home or business surveillance system with the Sheriff's Office. This information is put into a secure database that deputies and other law enforcement can utilize. When a crime is committed, law enforcement can access the database and determine who has cameras in the area. Law enforcement then reaches out to those individuals and requests to view the footage. This program

does not give law enforcement access to anyone's surveillance system, it simply lets us know who may have surveillance in the area. This collaboration with citizens helps law enforcement quickly find surveillance that helps identify perpetrators of crimes, thereby saving valuable manpower, and preventing suspects from committing additional crimes. In 2022, we continued to build a database of camera owners available to contact.

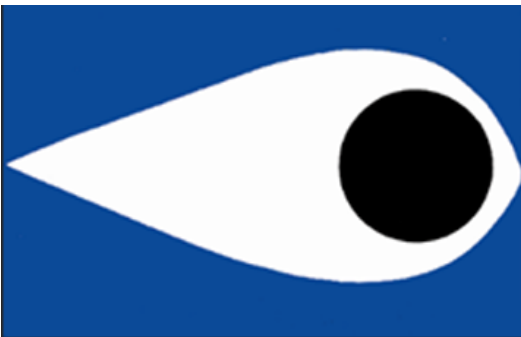
CITIZEN WELL-CHECK PROGRAM

The citizens of Randolph County are very valuable to us. We recognize that some elders in our community may need someone to check on them regularly. The Citizen Well-Check Program does just that. The program is FREE. Seniors enrolled in the program receive a call at the same time each day, five days a week. On Monday, Wednesday and Friday an automated call with a prerecorded message that the citizen simply confirms receipt of the message by pressing a key. On Tuesdays and Thursdays they receive a call from a live person to check their welfare. In the event the initial call is not answered or acknowledged, a second call is placed one hour later. If the second call is not answered, a third call will be made one hour after the second call. If the third call is not answered, a call will be placed to whoever has been designated as a contact person and a deputy will be dispatched to the residence to check on the citizen. This program helps to give our senior population and their families some peace of mind.

COMMUNITY WATCH



The Randolph County Sheriff's Office facilitates a Community Watch Program. A deputy will come out to your neighborhood meeting and discuss what a community watch means and how to start a program. Information is provided to homeowners on how to secure their residence, what type of suspicious activity to look for, and the options available when an issue arises. Information and complaints gathered at the community watch meetings are brought back, processed, and delivered to the right division for follow-up and investigation.

CRIME STOPPERS



Randolph County Crime Stoppers is an effective and proven, crime-fighting tool. Crime Stoppers uses information furnished by citizens to reduce crime through an expanded and stronger relationship between the community, police, and media.

The Sheriff's Office works closely with Crime Stoppers. Crime Stoppers pays out cash rewards of up to \$5,000 for information that leads to the arrest. Our partnership with Crime Stoppers helps solve crimes and keep our communities safer.

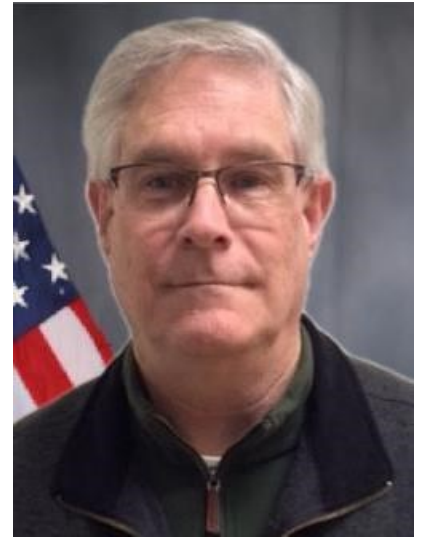
CITIZENS ACADEMY

The Citizens Academy presents and exposes participants to various topics and demonstrations similar to what Sheriff's Deputies receive. Through this program, the Sheriff's Office provides a broad educational experience within the mission of the Sheriff's Office, and the requirements of the law to which deputies must conform while carrying out their prescribed duties. The academy comprises ten sessions, meeting once a week during spring and fall sessions with the final session being a graduation ceremony. Citizens who attend the academy can make more informed judgments about the Sheriff's Office and law enforcement activities. Additionally, the Sheriff's Office can increase its awareness of feelings and concerns of the community, as expressed by attending



citizens. During these meetings, citizens and Sheriff's representatives have opportunities to discuss misconceptions harbored by both parties. Through open discussion, a more harmonious climate for relationships is achieved.

VOLUNTEER SHERIFF'S SERVICE OFFICERS



Sheriff Seabolt recognized that our citizens have a lot to offer. We recognize that our citizens want to get involved with their Sheriff's Office and as a result, the Volunteer Sheriff's Services Officer Program was born. This program provides a variety of support functions to the Sheriff's Office and citizens of Randolph County. Volunteers complete duties such as scanning and entering information, answering phones, assisting with fleet maintenance, and logistical support. Currently, we have three active volunteers who work hundreds of hours per month at no cost to the taxpayers. These volunteers free up staff to concentrate on other duties. All volunteers are at least 21 years old and complete an application process comprising an extensive background check and interview. Volunteers are also required to complete the Citizens Academy.

DETENTION DIVISION

The Detention Division is operated by the Jail Administrator/Major, Assistant Jail Administrator/ Captain, Administrative Captain and Administrative 1st Lt. of Operations. The Detention Division consists of a Detention Detective, Working Inmate Supervisor, Maintenance, Court Transportation, Statewide Transportation, Electronic House Arrest, Commissary Services/Inmate Account Officer, a Medical/Mental Health Rover and an Administrative Assistant. The Major, whose primary responsibility is to function as the Jail Administrator, commands the Randolph County Detention Center.

There are two divisions in the detention center.

- Operations Division
- Administration Division



The **Assistant Jail Administrator/Captain** assumes the exclusive role as Assistant Jail Administrator, working in lock step with the Jail Administrator. The focus of the Assistant Jail Administrator is recruiting and employee retention. Currently it is to also ensure the construction project continues without unnecessary delay.

The **Administrative Captain** assumes the duty of managing the administrative staff, medical records, food services, laundry, transportation, EHA, MTS (Security Electronics System) and the Tek84 Intercept Body Scanner. She also works hand in hand with the Administrative 1st Lt. of Operations to create a supportive environment for all employees and inmates that is solution driven with the intent to continuously improve working and living conditions at the jail.

DETENTION DIVISION

The **Administrative 1st Lieutenant of Operations** assumes duties to include maintenance, inmate classification, inmate management, custody, supervision and jail investigations. He also manages all IT and radio related matters. The Administrative 1st Lieutenant of Operations works hand-in-hand with the Administrative Captain to create a supportive environment for all employees and inmates that is solution driven with the intent to continuously improve working and living conditions in the jail.



The **Administrative Assistant** oversees the business end of the Detention Center which includes budget management, contracts and vendors, billing, petty cash, purchase orders, ordering supplies and uniforms and equipment for employees of the Detention Center.

RECORDS AND TRAINING

The Records and Training Division comprises two officers who maintain and update jail records in addition to coordinating in-Service training for all nonsworn detention officers.

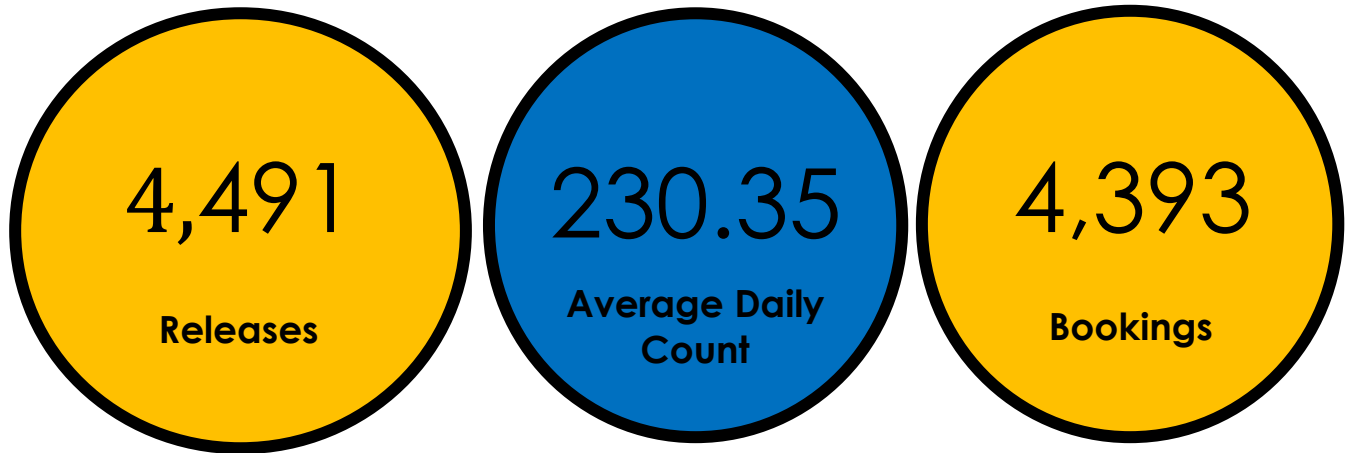

DETENTION SHIFTS/TEAMS



There are four Detention Shift Teams, each comprised of the following: Lieutenant, Sergeant, and Corporal, with 15 officer positions. Each team consists of Sworn and Detention Certified Officers. Teams handle the safety, security, and supervision of detainees in the Randolph County Detention Center, to safeguard the community, the lives of the staff, inmates, and visitors on the premises. Teams work two weeks on day shift and two weeks on night shift. Shift duty assignments consist of:

STATEWIDE AND COURT TRANSPORTATION

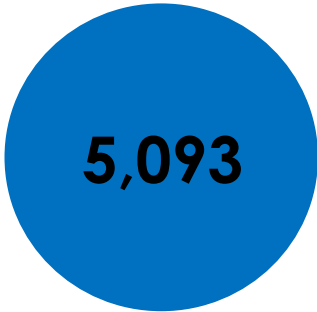
Transportation consists of six sworn officers with one supervising Sergeant. Statewide Transportation Deputies transport inmates to prisons and other jails all over the state, as well as picking up inmates from other jails; they transport between three and four hundred inmates each month. Court Transportation Deputies ensure that inmates and their paperwork are transported to and from the courthouse daily. Transportation officers travel to a total of 97 different jails and 53 different prisons within the State of North Carolina.



TRANSPORTATION BY THE NUMBERS



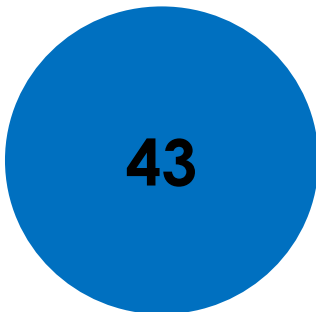

MAINTENANCE



The Maintenance Division consists of three officers with one Maintenance Supervisor. Maintenance maintains control of all facility tools while maintaining safe, efficient, and sanitary operations of the Detention Center. In 2022, the maintenance supervisor continued to work with Bordeaux Construction as the renovations of the existing building started. Maintenance must comply with all local and state building codes to ensure all life-safety

systems, such as fire alarm systems and fire suppression systems, are in place and functional. Officers maintain an on-call schedule for any emergencies that may arise or during inclement weather.

COMMISSARY SERVICES / INMATE ACCOUNTS

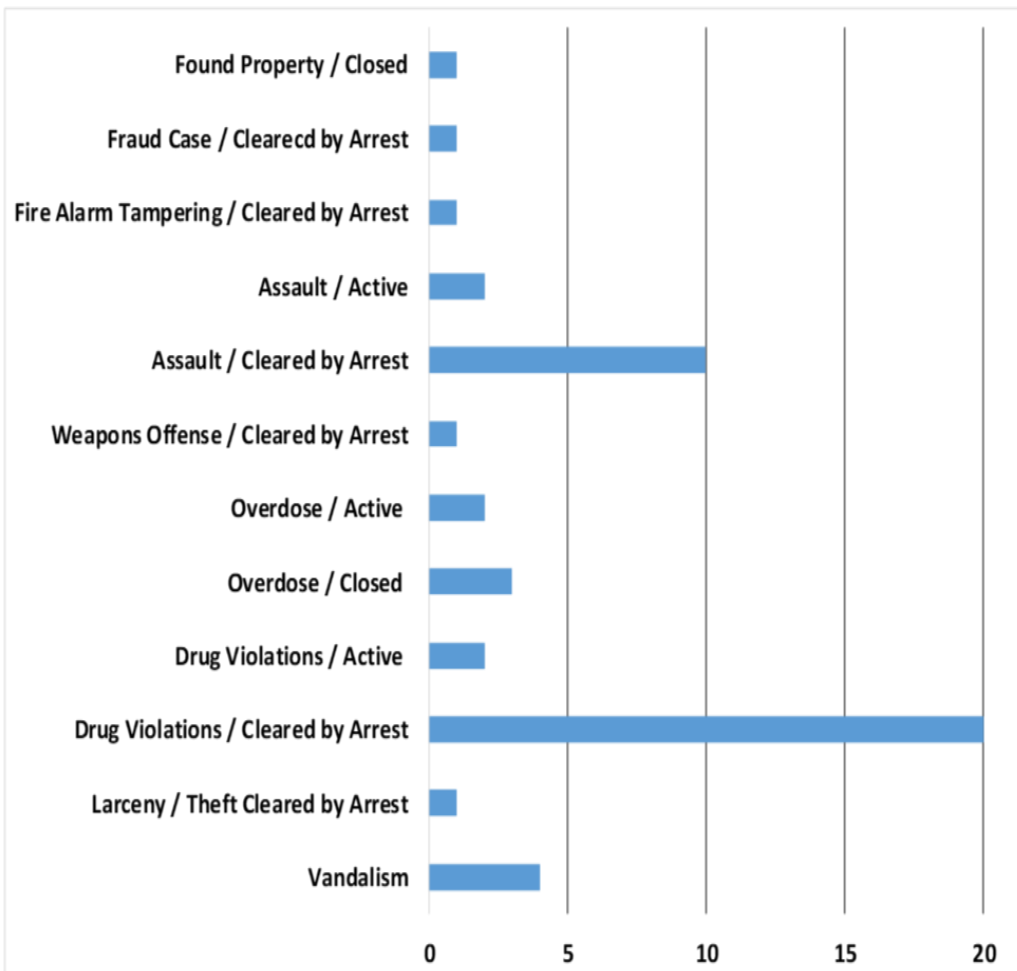
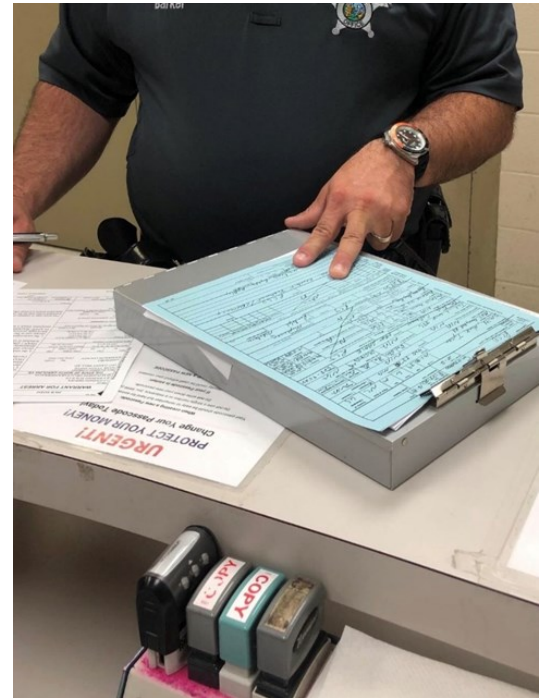
One officer manages inmate commissary services, inmate accounts and mail. The Commissary Officer keeps records of all transactions of commissary purchases as well as handling all accounting and record keeping.

In addition to commissary services, they handle all incoming and outgoing mail.



DETENTION INVESTIGATOR

The Detention Center has one full time detective that serves warrants on persons confined in the facility; investigates criminal acts committed by inmates; handles contraband found in the jail, such as drugs and weapons; assists the Criminal Investigations and Vice Divisions on investigations involving persons in confinement; charges inmates who are involved in inmate-on-inmate altercations that result in physical injury; assists in transportation of inmates outside the facility as needed.

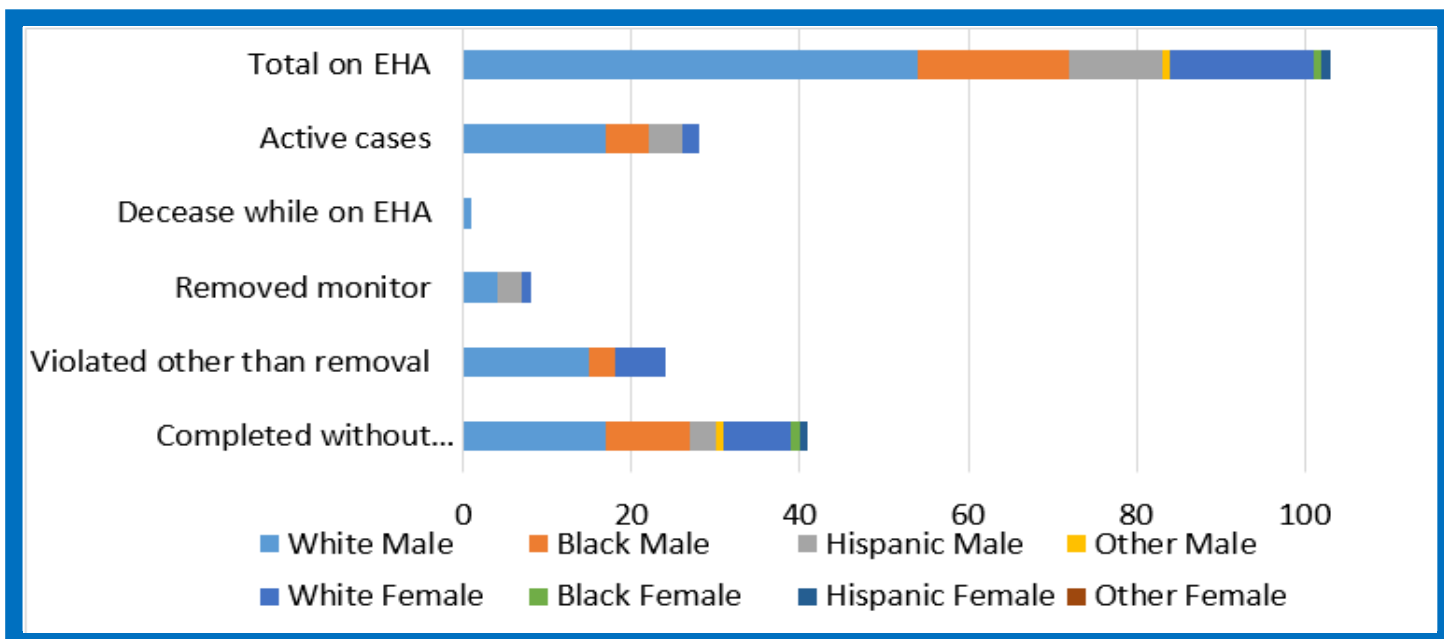
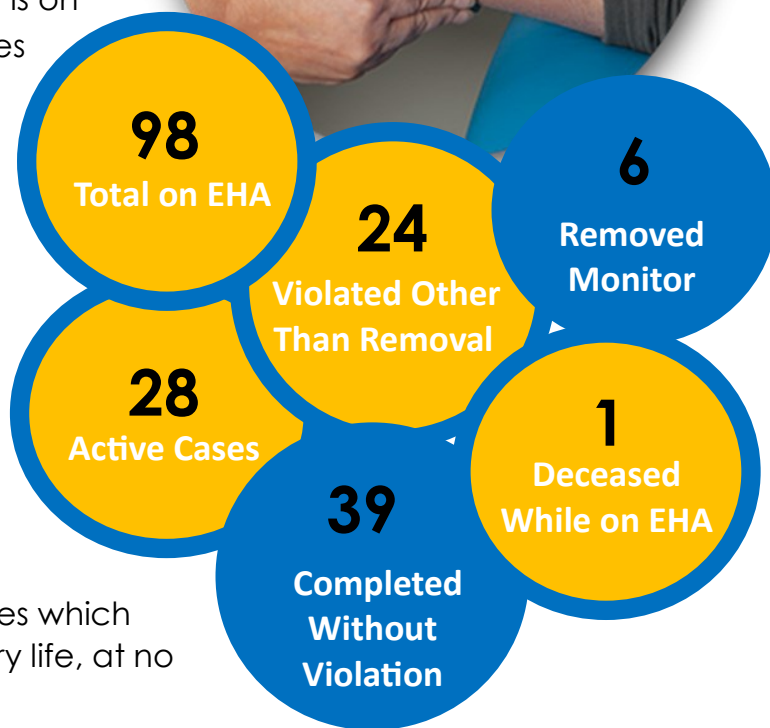
ELECTRONIC HOUSE ARREST

The Electronic House Arrest Division consists of three sworn officers with one supervising Sergeant. EHA Officers handle all aspects of supervision of offenders assigned EHA by the courts. They install and remove electronic monitoring equipment; investigate violations; manage monitoring devices; maintain offender files and records; network with local law enforcement, other court staff, and probation/parole departments. Each officer is on call for a week at a time for any emergencies or violations that may arise.



Accomplishments:

- Teamed up with NC Works in an effort to assist offenders in locating gainful employment
- Found partners in the area to assist with rehab, mental health, drug addiction and education.
- Increased home visits
- Completed an update to tracking devices which provides better service and longer battery life, at no additional costs.



JAIL EXPANSION AND RENOVATION

In 2022, the Randolph County Detention Center renovations started on G Pod, kitchen, training room, laundry, booking, Magistrate's area and lobby. H Pod was shut down and modified into a temporary staging area for the kitchen while the Detention Center kitchen undergoes renovation.



The existing kitchen coolers remain accessible to kitchen staff for cold storage. Meals are transported from the Guilford County Detention Center and plated in the temporary staging area.

The Detention Center laundry has been shut down for renovation and the laundry is transported offsite.

Inmates transitioned from G Pod to F Pod and other housing units in the new addition that opened in 2021, to allow for renovations to begin in that housing unit. Renovations to G Pod will transform dry cells into wet cells and provide a 48-cell Maximum Security housing unit upon completion.

COVID PROTOCOL COORDINATOR / TRAINING SERGEANT

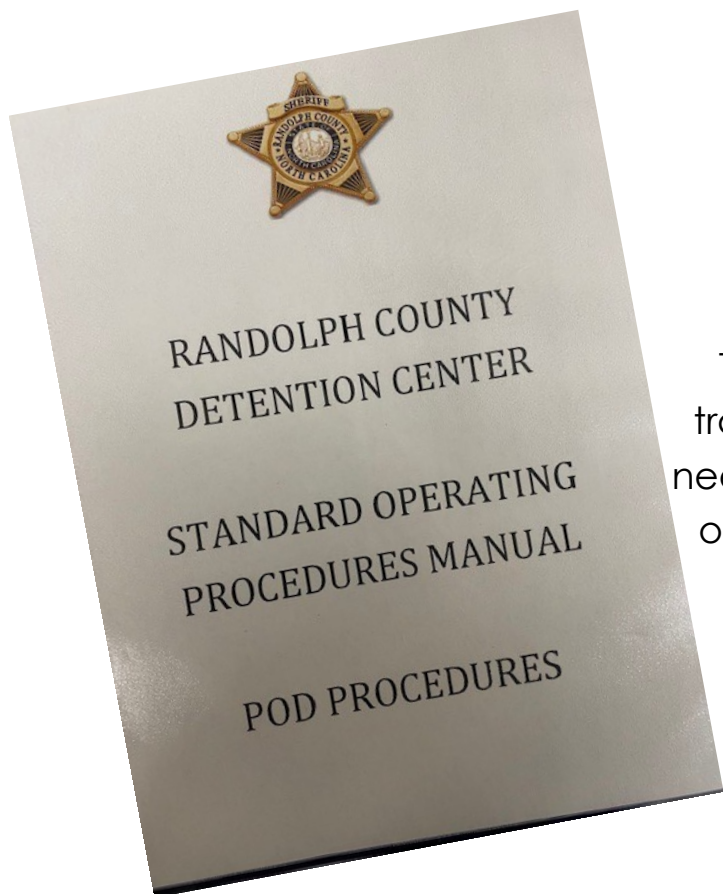
The Detention Center ceased mandatory Covid testing of all inmates and officers around March of 2022. Covid testing continued, but only on symptomatic individuals. Rapid Testing continues for all offenders that have been sentenced to Department of Adult Corrections. Offenders must have a negative Covid test before they will be accepted into any prison.

CIVIL DIVISION

The Randolph County Sheriff's Office Civil Division serves all Civil Process papers within Randolph County. The Civil Division has 12 full-time employees; a Captain, Lieutenant, Sergeant, two Corporals, six deputies, and a clerk. The Captain and Lieutenant handle the daily activities of the Civil Division. The Clerk is an civilian position, responsible for entering and tracking all civil processes which are divided into four groups:

Process Service

The Sergeant and three Deputies cover service of Subpoenas, Civil Summons, and Magistrate Summons, Orders to Show Cause, Juvenile Summons, Juvenile Orders, Child Custody Orders, and Serving Involuntary Commitments. Transporting of Involuntary Commitments out of the county is shared by all civil deputies.

Execution of Writs (enforcement of court orders)

The enforcement of court orders are handled by one Corporal and one Deputy. They handle the enforcement of judgments through Evictions, Collection of Taxes, Money Owed, both Real and Personal Property, by seizing and returning the property to its rightful owner, or by seizing and selling real and personal property for repayment of debt.

Domestic Violence Enforcement

One Deputy covers the service and enforcement of Chapter 50-B (Domestic Violence Protective Orders) and 50-C Orders (Non-Contact Order). In some orders, weapons must be seized, children are removed from parental custody, and/or the defendant is temporarily removed from his or her residence.

Child Support Enforcement

A Corporal and one Deputy serve all Establishment Summons, Orders to Show Cause, and arrest defendants who fail to appear in Child Support Court, (Civil Orders for Arrest). These deputies work closely with the Randolph County Child Support Enforcement Agency caseworkers.

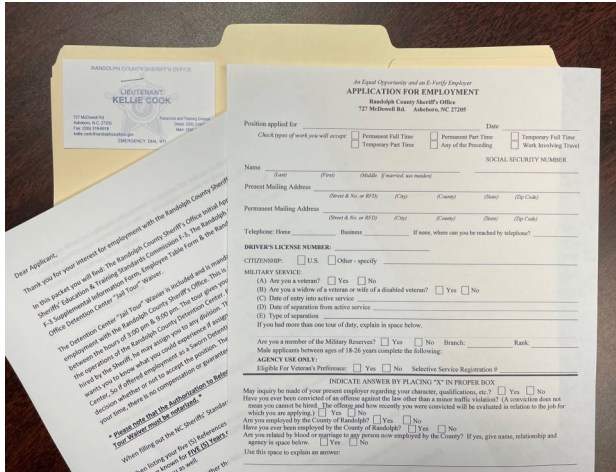
RCSO Civil Division 2022 Yearly Totals...





ADMINISTRATIVE SERVICES

The RCSO Administrative Services Division consists of the Personnel & Training Unit, Evidence Control Unit, Records Unit, and Permitting Unit. The units are made up of 14 RCSO staff members, consisting of 10 sworn deputies and four civilians.



PERSONNEL & TRAINING UNIT

The Randolph County Sheriff's Office Personnel and Training Unit handles all applicant background investigations, personnel training, and documentation, ensuring compliance with all requirements as set forth by the North Carolina Sheriff's Training Standards Education Division, and maintaining and issuing uniforms and equipment.

This Unit maintains certified training records for the office; they ensure officers are properly registered for specialized training, and ensure compliance with mandatory annual training as set forth by the NC Sheriff's Education and Training Standards Commission. Deputies and Detention Officers are mandated to attend a prescribed number of hours of training each year to maintain their certification, and The Randolph County Sheriff's Office collaborates with Randolph Community College to offer local training. The training is taught by certified instructors from within the agency. Deputies also request and are encouraged to attend additional, specialized training, throughout the year to develop new skills or improve their current skill set.

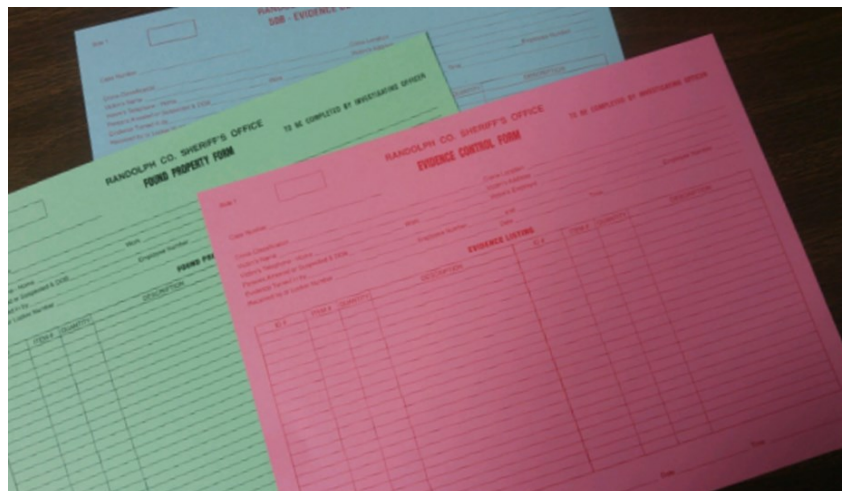

EVIDENCE CONTROL UNIT

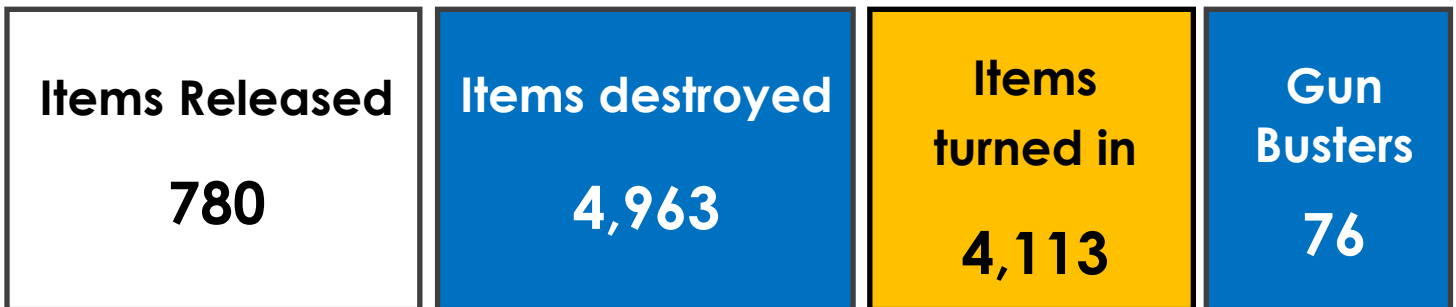
The Evidence Control Unit is responsible for receiving, storing, and preserving evidence collected relative to investigations within our jurisdiction. The Evidence Control Unit is managed and operated by two sworn deputies. Each year, Evidence Control takes in several thousand found, seized, surrendered, or recovered items. Additional duties include, but are not limited to:

- Completing state lab evidence processing requests
- Assisting citizens with return of property
- Transferring and disposing of property and evidence at outside facilities
- Processing narcotics for disposal
- Processing firearms for release, trade, or disposal
- Processing an auction
- Receiving, storing, and disposing of bicycles and motorized vehicles
- Reviewing criminal history background checks to determine the appropriate release of firearms
- Determining rightful ownership of seized firearms
- Transporting evidence to and from the NC Crime Lab and the DNA lab in Raleigh
- Conducting inventory audits testifying in court regarding the chain-of-custody of evidence

In 2023, the Evidence Control Unit looks to continue its hard work with the Randolph County District Attorney's Office, to complete court orders to return property to its rightful owners. The Evidence Control unit also seeks to expand its storage area to meet the needs of the county.

RECORDS UNIT

The Records Unit consists of five sworn officers and one civilian dedicated to assisting the citizens of Randolph County when they call or come into the office. The Records Unit has a deputy assigned to the Archdale office to assist citizens, as well. The Records Unit is responsible for processing, maintaining, and managing reports, citations, and other documents for the Sheriff's Office.

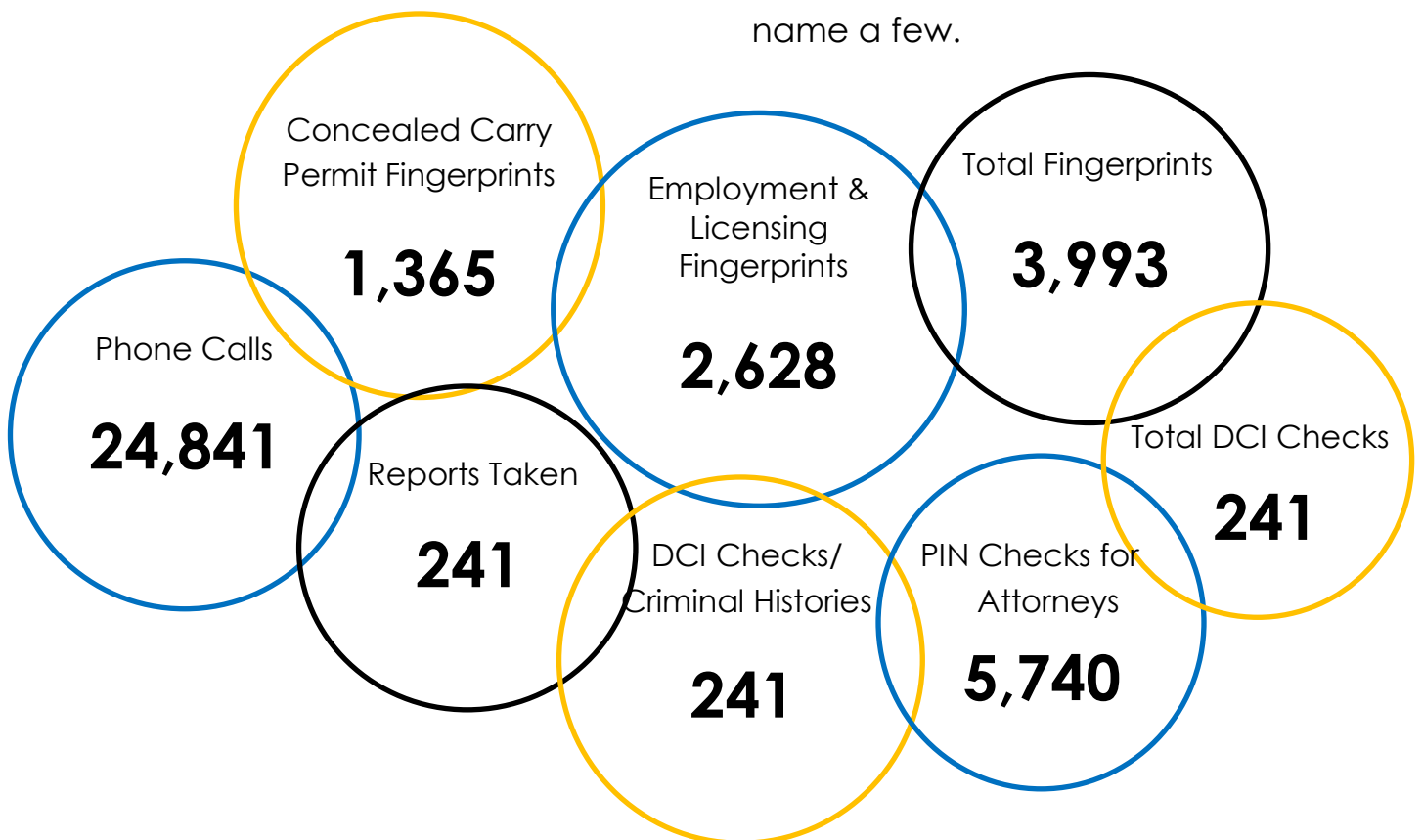
The RCSO Records Unit looks forward to serving the citizens of Randolph County in 2023.



Administration Division

When a citizen calls or comes to the Randolph County Sheriff's Office, the first person encountered is a Desk Officer. Desk Officers are the face of the Sheriff's Office; the first impression they make on citizens greatly affects that citizen's perception of the Randolph County Sheriff's Office. There are currently two sworn deputies assigned to the front desk who provide services and assist citizens with a helpful, friendly, and professional attitude. Desk Officers can answer a wide array of questions over the phone, and provide services, such as serving criminal summons, taking reports, or completing supplements to crimes already reported, and serving subpoenas.

In the event a Desk Officer cannot assist the citizen, the Desk Officer can direct them to a deputy in the appropriate division, for assistance. On average, our Desk Officers answer 90-110 calls a day at the Sheriff's Office. In many situations, Desk Officers can resolve non-emergency issues over the phone, therefore allowing deputies to remain available for emergency call response. Desk Officers can also take reports at the Sheriff's Office if a citizen does not want a deputy dispatched to their residence. The Records Unit is also responsible for fingerprinting citizens for a variety of reasons. These include Concealed Carry Permits, teachers, daycare workers, and professional licensing (nursing, insurance, pharmacy board, and more), just to name a few.



PERMITTING UNIT

The Permitting Unit consists of three civilian staff members that process all handgun purchases and concealed carry permits. This is a very busy unit within the Sheriff's Office; they receive assistance from the Records Unit as needed.

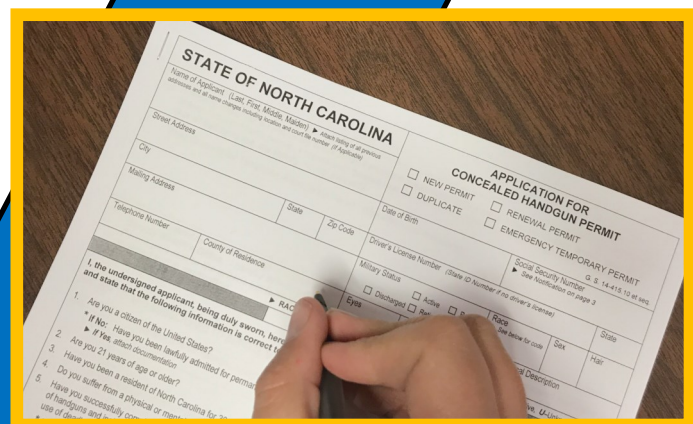
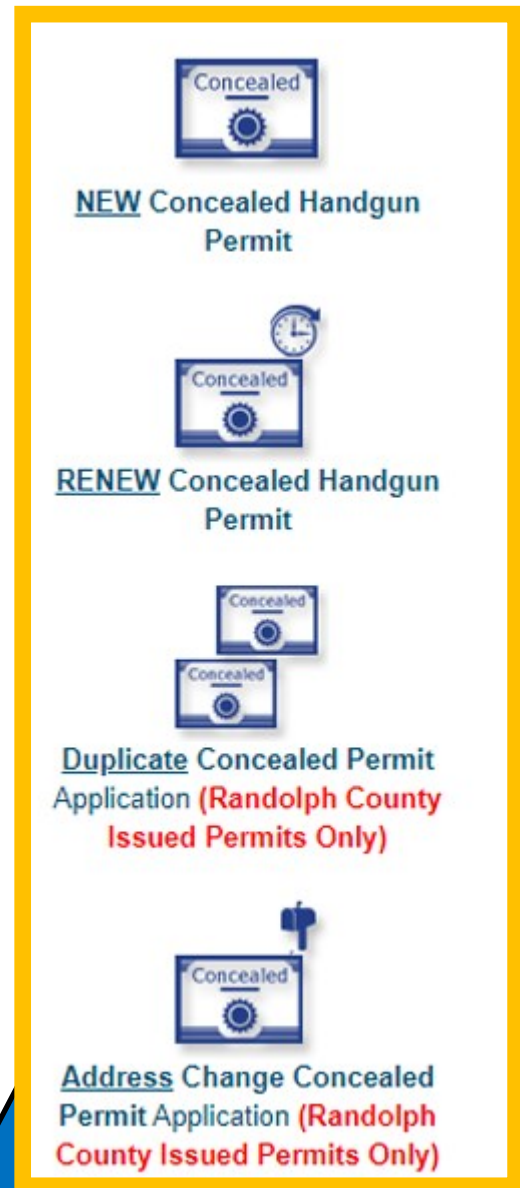

All units in this group work tirelessly to support Randolph County citizens and beyond, as well as our officers



HONOR GUARD

In 2005, the first six Randolph County deputies graduated from a mandated training course for Honor Guard duties and procedures. This marked the official beginning of the Randolph County Sheriff's Honor Guard

The Randolph County Sheriff's Office Honor Guard is a specialized team of deputy volunteers employed by the Sheriff's Office. Honor Guard assignments are typically ceremonial in nature. These assignments can include but are not limited to, funerals, graduations, community events, and parades. Members of the Sheriff's Office Honor Guard are selected based on the candidate's excellent decorum, professionalism, discipline and, excellent standing with the agency.



The Randolph County Sheriff's Office Honor Guard was unofficially formed following the untimely, line-of-duty death of Deputy Toney Summey on the 27th day of April in the year 2003. Following Deputy Summey's death, several deputies volunteered to assist with the ceremonial duties of honoring their fallen comrade. Following this incident, it was apparent to former Sheriff Litchard Hurley that there was a need for a professionally trained team of deputies that could conduct these ceremonial duties when needed.

Support Services

The Randolph County Honor Guard Unit consisted of five sworn deputies in 2022. Although that number is low, the five members are a strong core group of committed men and women that continuously give up time away from their families to serve this agency and our communities . I look forward to seeing what 2023 will bring to our unit.

MOTOR UNIT

The Randolph County Sheriff's Office Motor Unit started in 2007 under the leadership of Sheriff Maynard Reid. The Harley Davidson Electra Glide Police motorcycles were purchased using Asset Forfeiture Funds, otherwise commonly referred to as drug money. Currently, the Motor Unit consists of five sworn deputies who rotate escorting events throughout the year. These deputy volunteers participate mostly on the weekends and holidays, using the motorcycles to escort motorcades across Randolph and sometimes into neighboring counties. The Motor Unit assists with various events throughout the year; requests

include escorts for events that help raise money for local charities. The majority of the events attended each year are motorcycle rides, but they also assist with bicycle and tractor rides, funeral escorts, school events, meet and greets, and holiday parades. In addition, the Motor Unit often attends local community and school events for educational purposes. The Motor Unit's primary job is to help escort motoring events safely throughout a planned route from one destination to another. Events are escorted by a minimum of two riders; one leads the event as the second rider speeds ahead to block intersections, ensuring the event can safely proceed. Larger event rides sometimes require the assistance from other agency Motor Units and our team therefore often

coordinates with Davidson County Sheriff's Office, Greensboro Police Department, High Point Police Department and Guilford County Sheriff's Office to ensure enough manpower is allocated for an event; they also assist those agencies with larger events.

Cpl. Neill Blackmon of the Civil Division leads the Motor Unit. In addition to his regular duties, he processes requests for Motor Unit escorts, pre-plans routes and schedules Motor Unit members for planned rides. He has been a member of the unit since 2010. The Motor Unit provides a valuable service the citizens of Randolph County and the motoring public. One may think that being a member of the Motor Unit would be a pleasant motorcycle ride on a pretty day. However, these men ride regardless of the weather, it may be 95 degrees or 25 degrees; rain or shine they answer the request to escort. Each of them have given up many evenings and Saturdays with their families to provide this service to Randolph County. Their dedication and commitment to serving our community is commendable and greatly appreciated.



SHERIFF'S EMERGENCY RESPONSE TEAM

The Sheriff's Emergency Response Team (SERT) Intra-County Team was activated for many different operations in 2022, to include Barricaded Subjects, Civil Unrest, and many High-Risk Search Warrants throughout Randolph and adjoining counties. This report outlines the team's usage, training, programs implemented, and future programs for the year 2023.

The Sheriff's Emergency Response Team is currently comprised of 15 volunteer Randolph County deputies and 3 volunteer officers from the Archdale Police Department and one officer from the Liberty Police Department. The team responded to and/or assisted in 23 different operations in the year 2022. This is a similar number of deployments, in comparison to 2021, where in the team responded to 24 operations..

In 2022, the team responded to 10 Agency Assist calls for service that included barricades, other jurisdictional search warrants, and a high-risk civil unrest situation. The team responded to 11 High-Risk Search Warrants in Randolph County.

Public Demonstrations

In addition to responding to the many different types of tasks described thus far, the Randolph County SERT is also tasked with attending public demonstrations throughout the year. In 2022, the team attended 13 demos consisting of church venues, RCSO Citizens Academy, Randolph Leadership, Fire Department Camp, and the RCSO Junior Sheriff's Academy. This does not include events where the "Bearcat", our armored rescue vehicle is solely used in instances such as parades and other public events.

Team Training

Team Training for Randolph County SERT consists of approximately 8 hours of monthly training, with some longer days, which are dictated by the specific type of training for each respective month. In 2020, the team implemented an additional 4 hours monthly training consisting of "Firearms Open Range" where team members and other deputies who aspire to become SERT Operators will work on skill development, combat fitness, and marksmanship.

Emergency Deployment Readiness Exercise (EDRE)

In 2022, Randolph County SERT conducted an Emergency Deployment Readiness Exercise (EDRE) in the Archdale area. This event consisted of several scenario-based incidents that challenged its operators to prepare for real-life situations, while utilizing resources such as negotiators, and supporting elements from other agencies. The event was hosted in a local neighborhood, in a dedicated training structure that offered a very realistic environment. This

exercise was designed to create a response from our team that reflected similar high-risk incidents which have occurred recently in our region. Following the EDRE, it was noted from the team's leadership and participating instructors, that the event was a success. Team leaders and members



all demonstrated a tenacity for accomplishing the task, fierce concentration, demonstrated an ability to accomplish critical thinking skills under stress, and utilize their formal training as expected.

SERT Camp 2022

In 2022, The Randolph County SERT completed its first SERT Camp. This training event was a planned two-day training session, which challenged operators with critical thinking exercises, team building activities and live scenario based training. Operators worked together in small teams and completed a lengthy course filled with obstacles that promoted team cohesion, critical thinking, and physical stamina to completing a 5-mile run, before then entering a chemical filled gashouse and navigating through the structure to complete the training evolution. Operators found ways to advance through the arduous



training session by communicating concisely and working as a team, in order to successfully complete all stations. This training session was made possible by collaborating with community businesses such as Lowes, Food Lion, and Fresh Cuts as they helped with necessities for our team during the camp.

New Programs for 2022

In 2022, Randolph County SERT attended what is considered an industry-standard school of instruction for breaching designed to cultivate the skills sets necessary for breaching a variety of structures. This training provided opportunities for our breachers to work with residential and commercial doors, barricades, saws, ballistic breaching, and torches, as well as being challenged with various styles of locking systems.



Future Programs for 2023

A Leadership Development program, through the National Tactical Officer's Association, will be implemented with the intention to assist in the cultivation of new SERT leaders as they find themselves advancing their career, being tasked with planning, organizing, and facilitating a wide variety of SERT operations. The program will identify individuals who are dedicated, and prepared to accept the added responsibilities. The program will further their respective training, baseline skill set, and provide the necessary experience through the National Tactical Officer's Leadership Development Classes.

DISASTER ASSISTANCE RESPONSE TEAM

The Randolph County Sheriff's Office Disaster Assistance Response Team, referred to as DART, is a volunteer group of 14 sworn deputies from various divisions of the Sheriff's Office that each bring a wealth of knowledge and experience to the team.

Each team member has training and experience in search and rescue, tactical man-tracking, land navigation, emergency first-aid, surveillance, and many other areas of specialized training that have prepared them to help, serve, and protect the citizens of Randolph County in a variety of disaster situations.

The Randolph County Sheriff's Office is one of only three law enforcement agencies in North Carolina to have sworn officers with this level of training, formally certified and prepared to provide disaster relief and assistance to Randolph County, as well as other areas of the state or country upon request. DART members are prepared to respond to disasters such as bomb explosions, terrorism, and arson, as well as natural disasters such as hurricanes, floods, tornadoes, and fires. Each team member has training and experience in search and rescue, tactical man-tracking, land navigation, emergency first-aid, surveillance, and many other areas of specialized training that have prepared



them to help, serve, and protect the citizens of Randolph County in a variety of disaster situations. A strong law enforcement presence in any of these situations helps ease fears, and prevent others from exploiting communities during times of disaster. These deputies are poised to go house to house searching for the injured, to recover bodies, or identify those who need assistance. DART members can offer transportation, emergency medical care and act as a liaison between citizens and rescue personnel.

DISASTER ASSISTANCE RESPONSE TEAM

In disaster areas, the team will set up a security perimeter to restrict persons from unsafe areas. This team warns people when any other emergency may become an immediate threat to safety and welfare.

Many disasters cause failures in infrastructures, such as electricity and water systems, and unsafe travel conditions for automobiles and pedestrians. The team can help with obtaining resources, and re-supply stranded citizens until they can be properly and safely evacuated from disaster areas.

DART members will close unsafe roads where downed wires, trees, or flood situations might make travel unsafe. Disaster situations often lead to family members being separated. Elderly and those living alone are at higher risk if they have no one to check on them. If these citizens are unaware of what the current situations are around them, problems may result. DART members can set up search teams and put together systems where loved ones can check in.

The DART can set up reunification centers where victims and families can meet during and after disasters. They are trained to work with emergency personnel to list the various medical facilities used for treating sick or injured people. When people are evacuated

from homes or neighborhoods, houses are unsupervised and opportunities to commit crime may be rampant; leaving them susceptible to those who take advantage of a chaotic situation. Law enforcement presence deters looting, vandalism, and theft. If looting occurs, DART members are prepared to investigate and apprehend suspects. Most of all, DART members are deployed to restore peace and order to communities amid traumatic events.

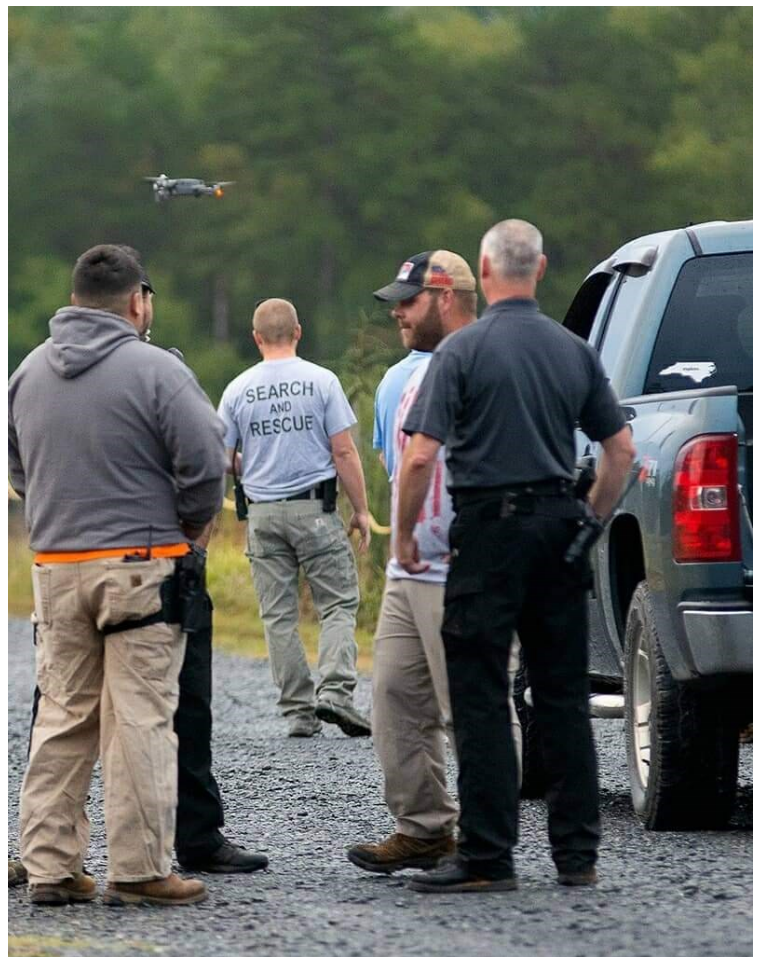

In 2022, Team members attended NC Wilderness Law Enforcement Training, which included weather survival training with woodland surveillance, and woodland apprehension techniques. This team trains monthly to prepare for any situation or scenario that could occur in North Carolina, from the mountains to the beaches. This unit is devoted to helping every citizen in their darkest hour, and locating the lost or those on the run.

FLEET MAINTENANCE OPERATIONS

Sheriff Seabolt opened the Randolph County Sheriff's Office Fleet Maintenance Facility in 2020. The facility currently has two fulltime employees, two part-time employees, one reserve deputy, and one volunteer. One sworn deputy is in charge of the day-to-day operations of the facility and the other positions are all filled by civilian personnel. All of the employees have mechanical and automotive technical experience. The Fleet Facility is responsible for maintaining a fleet of over 270 vehicles. Some of the services performed at the facility include oil changes, inspections, mounting and balancing tires, brake jobs, and many other repairs ranging from minor to major. The



Fleet Director works closely with vendors to ensure that we get the right parts and supplies for the best price. The average downtime for routine maintenance is 30 minutes or less, with back-up vehicles available if repairs take longer; resulting in deputies quickly being back in service to respond to calls. Fleet Maintenance works diligently to diagnose mechanical problems. One such issue noticed was a driveshaft carrier bearing wearing out after around 70,000 miles. The obvious solution



was a new driveshaft at a cost of over \$1,000.00. However, fleet staff researched the problem and found a replacement carrier bearing assembly for \$300.00. In addition to saving money on costly repairs, the Fleet Director constantly compares supply and stock parts costs between vendors to ensure the best parts, at the best price are being used. Those efforts ensure that we are being good stewards of tax dollars and that the tax payers' fleet, worth millions of dollars, is being well maintained.

For nearly two decades, the Fleet Maintenance Building and surrounding property has endured an issue with drainage. Rain water runs into the building under a roll up door during steady rains creating large pools of water inside the building. Additionally, the runoff washes away the graveled lot and causes erosion around the security fence. Using carry-over funds from the last budget year, a grading and paving project has been approved by the county commissioners to correct the longstanding infrastructure issue. Thereby reinvesting the funds saved by fleet maintenance back into the building as good stewards of the taxpayers' property.

FLEET MAINTENANCE OPERATIONS

In the 2021-2022 budget year, our fleet maintenance costs totaled \$251,362.28. The aforementioned total includes \$116,284.84 in body repair costs paid to outside vendors. Therefore, we were able to maintain our fleet for approximately \$135,077.44. Well on track to ensure the Fleet Maintenance Operations continues to benefit the tax payers.

Fleet Maintenance employees are always willing to go the extra mile to make sure every job is done correctly so that our deputies have safe and reliable Patrol vehicles.

The Randolph County Sheriff's Office budget is approved and amended throughout the fiscal year as necessary by the Board of County Commissioners. The Commissioners consistently provide the needed funding to not only operate the Sheriff's Office but expand services, improve processes, mitigate longstanding infrastructure issues and evolve the Sheriff's Office into the 21st Century. 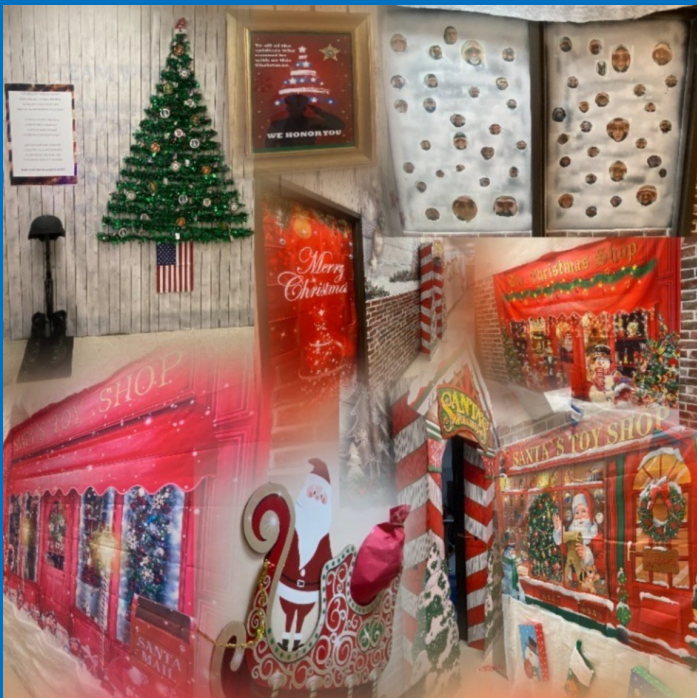

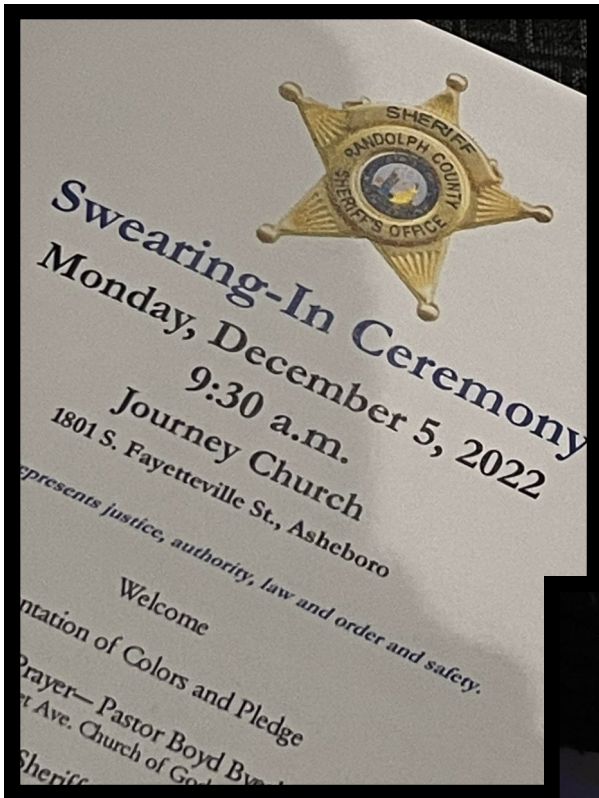


ACCOMPLISHMENTS

- Moved Criminal Investigations Division to Northgate Government Complex and renovated their former Sheriff's Office space for the new Patrol Office.
- Updated and animated CARE Program to integrate modern technology to engage the younger generation
- Updated ventilation system in Special Operations building to mitigate air quality issues
- Developed and implemented Standard Operating Procedures for the Detention Center
- Implemented an electronic mail system at the Detention Center to decrease contraband in the facility
- Expanded capabilities of the Internet Crimes Against Children (ICAC) Computer Lab for forensic evidence collection through grant funding
- Expanded the Trinity Patrol contract by three deputies in cooperation with the City of Trinity, to reduce response times, increase preventative patrol and community policing
- Implemented Executime digital timekeeping for Sheriff's Office
- Developed and implemented Professional Standards Reports to monitor and identify potential adverse behaviors/actions of deputies/officers
- Obtained additional less lethal weapon kits for Patrol through a grant
- Collaborated with the Randolph County Schools to add four more School Resource Officers to protect our children at the county elementary schools.

- Continue working on the paperless project for the Sex Offender Registry Program.
- As a part of the end of 2022 restructuring, we will establish a Professional Standards Captain position to facilitate state mandated requirements and to help us ensure our team is providing the high level of service you demand and we expect.
- Update the former Patrol Division office space for the Civil Division.
- Implement Mobile Arrest Reports
- Upgrade data technology for Patrol and at the Detention Center
- Enhance courthouse security through technology
- Establish a recruitment team to develop strategies to attract potential officers
- Replace aging patrol vehicles and motorcycles
- Expand evidence storage to accommodate growing storage needs
- Expand the less-lethal program
- Armed Detention Officer program
